

### Eagles Run Over Neligh '11', 37-0

#### O'Neill May Retain Big Trophy

By virtue of a resounding 37-0 shellacking of the visiting Neligh Warriors Friday night in Carney park, the O'Neill high Eagles became permanent possessors of The Frontier-Neligh News trophy, established by the two newspapers five years ago.

Emil Reutzel, jr., publisher of The News, and Carroll W. Stewart, publisher of The Frontier, stipulated in 1949 that the handsome bronze trophy would be in the possession of the winning team for a year following each meeting. Three successive victories by one school, however, would mean automatic permanent possession. Reutzel and Stewart made the presentation to Capt. Duane Alton following Friday night's overpowering win over the Warriors—the third over the Maroons.

They also stated a new trophy will be provided next year's winner in the ancient rivalry.

Eagle ballcarriers sparked in Friday's easy win. Fullback Duane Booth romped through right guard and raced 60 yards to score the first touchdown. Halfback Harold Dexter went 70 yards for the second TD and End Warren Seger skirted end from one yard out for the third TD in the first half, O'Neill leading 18-0 at intermission.

Halfback Bob Davidson was sprung off-tackle for a 55-yard scoring romp in the third. Seger took a pass to score, the play covering 45 yards, and Booth added insult to injury by plowing 80 yards to windup the Blues' scoring. Booth kicked one extra point.

O'Neill was obliged to kick only once; Neligh six times.

Neligh drove to the O'Neill 4

in the dying minutes against O'Neill reserves. Coaches Marv Miller and Paul Baker inserted their first stringers and the Neligh score was staved off.

The Warriors were sorely handicapped by injuries—several regulars being obliged to sit out the game and one player needed medical aid after he was kicked in the face by an O'Neill player.

Booth, Dexter, Davidson and Seger were offensive standouts for the winners, while Alton, Larry McConnell, Lyle Davis and Larry Chace were good defensively. Moon was best offensively for Neligh; Gabelman, defensively.

A St. Mary's fumble set up the third TD when Jerry Corkle ran 10 yards.

The SMA team, fired by Dick Graham, a one-man gang in a small bundle, drove to the Knights' 25 where Lawler intercepted a SMA flip. Lawler raced 65 yards on that, interception to score. Three plays later Mock intercepted another SMA pass and ran 65 yards to score.
