EWING—Fifteen new members were initiated into the Ewing chapter of the Future Homemakers of America by a candle-light ceremony Tuesday evening, November 3.

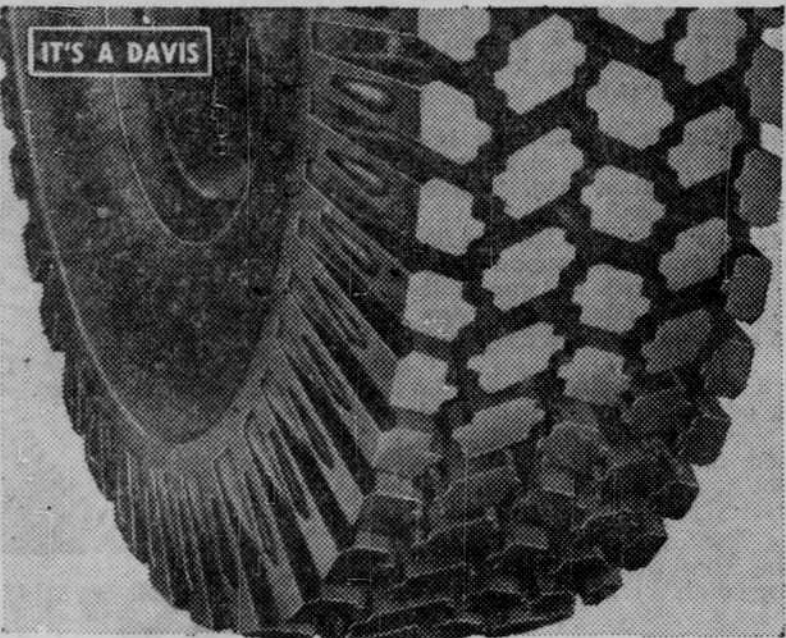

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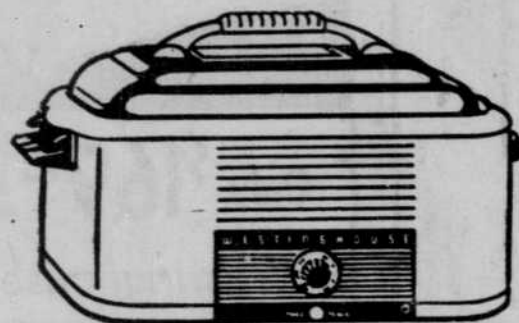

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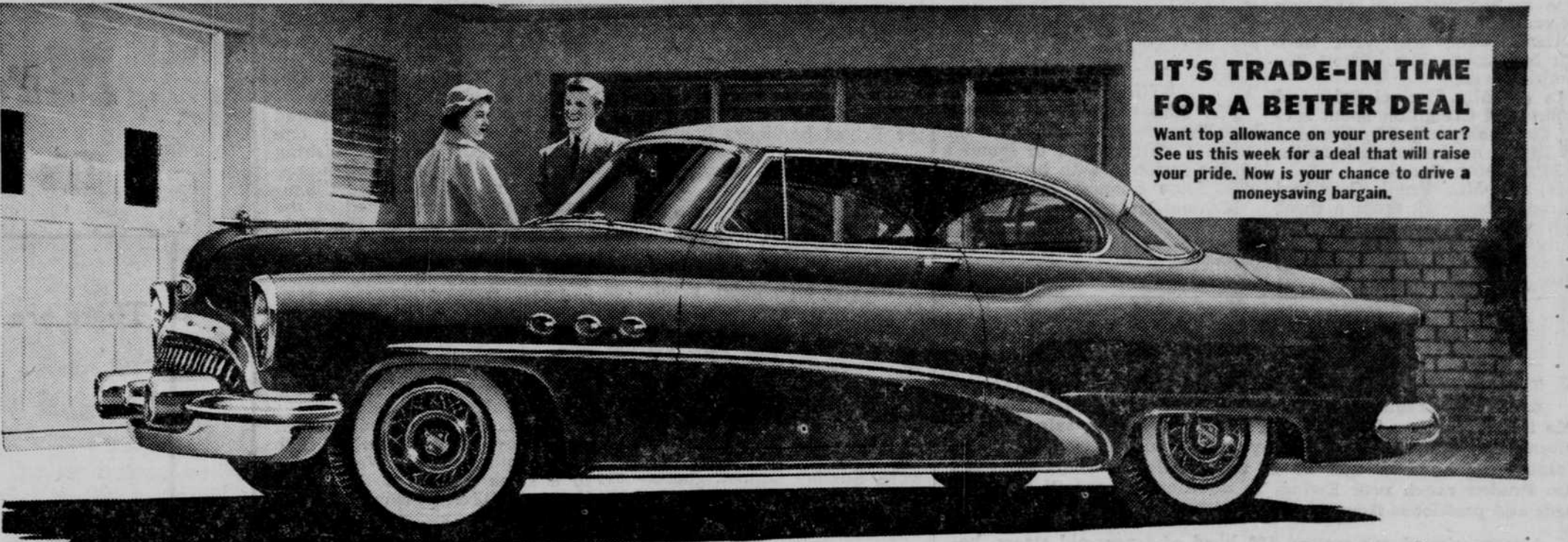
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
