In 1902 the family moved to Dorsey. After the death of her husband in 1942, Mrs. Cihlar moved to Lynch.

Tickets for the rides on the miniature streamliner were given by merchants and long lines of children waited for rides despite the cold weather. Children waited until late that night.

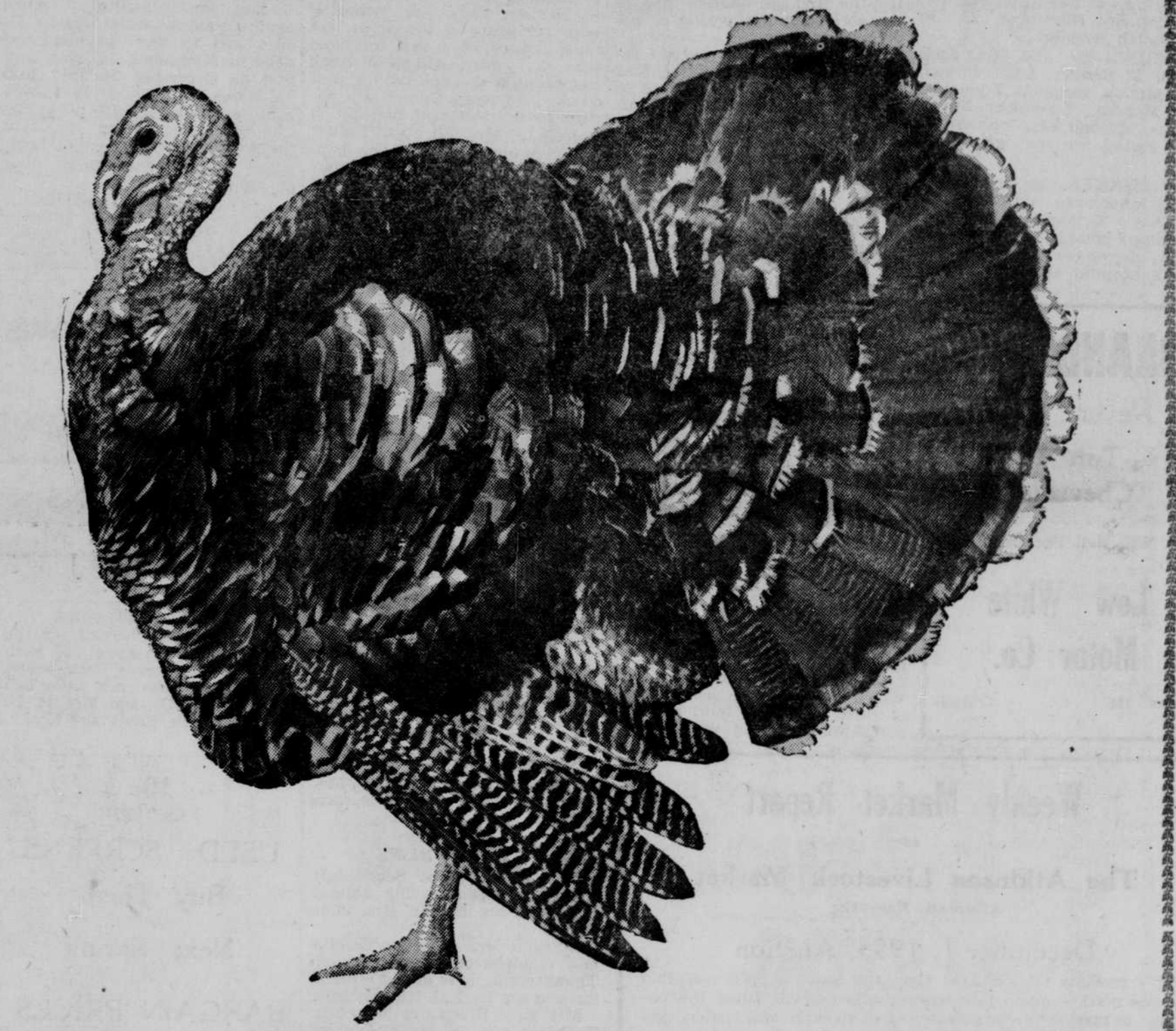
**Negro Missions
