ORDINANCE NO. 278-A OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL

An Ordinance creating a Board of Park Commissioners for the City of O'Neill, Holt County, Nebraska; providing for the compensation of the Board and the Qualifications for membership; outlining the manner of selecting Park Board members, their terms of office and designating the powers and duties of the Board; providing for the repeal of prior ordinances in conflict; prescribing the time when this Ordinance shall be in full force and take effect; and prescribing a penalty for the destruction of Park property.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska:
 Section 1. There is hereby created a board of park commissioners for the City. Such Board shall be composed of three members who shall be resident freeholders of the City and who shall be appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the Council. Neither the Mayor or any member of the Council shall be a member of the Park Board. The Board of Park Commissioners shall have the management and control of all swimming pools, athletic fields, parks, park areas within the limits of public streets, public grounds for recreation and conservational purposes and play grounds belonging to the City. Immediately after the effective date of this Ordinance, the Mayor shall appoint a full Board of three members, one of whom shall be appointed for a term of three years, one of whom shall be appointed for a term of two years, and one of whom shall be appointed for a term of one year, all of such appointments to date May 1st, 1953. Thereafter, commencing with the last Tuesday in April in 1954, one member of the Park Board shall be appointed each year for a term of three years and on the last Tuesday in April of each and every year thereafter, one member shall likewise be appointed for a term of three years, all of such terms to end on May 1st in successive years. Each Park Commissioner so appointed shall hold office until his successor is duly appointed and qualified. In case of vacancy by resignation or any other cause, the Mayor and Council shall fill such vacancy for the unexpired term in the manner provided for the selection of appointive officers of the City. Two members of the Park Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and at the first meeting after their appointment, and each year thereafter, they shall elect from their number a chair-

man and secretary, which offices shall not be held by the same person.
 Section 2. All monies derived from taxation, donation or any other source intended to be used for park purposes in and for said City, shall be held by the City Treasurer and kept separate and apart from all other funds. All claims against said park funds shall be audited by the Park Board and warrants for payment of claims shall be drawn by the Chairman of the Park Board and shall be countersigned by the secretary thereof, and no park funds shall be disbursed in any other manner or shall be used for any purpose other than park purposes. A report of the doings of the Park Board shall be submitted to the Mayor and Council on or before the 2nd Monday in April of each year. All warrants so drawn and countersigned shall be paid by the City Treasurer out of the park fund. The City Treasurer shall be treasurer ex officio of the Park Board.
 Section 3. Such funds as shall be, by the City Council, each year levied as a tax for park purposes, shall be when collected put into the city treasury and shall constitute the park fund of the City. The funds so collected shall be used for laying out, maintaining, improving and beautifying such parks and for the payment of salaries and wages of persons employed in the performance of labor done in the various municipal activities under the jurisdiction of the Park Board.
 Section 4. Any person who shall cut down, injure or destroy any tree, plant or shrub, or who shall injure or destroy any building, equipment or paraphernalia belonging to the city, and installed in its parks or on any other public property used in connection with any municipal activity under the Park Board jurisdiction, or who shall commit any waste or any kind upon the property of such activity, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00.
 Section 5. This Ordinance shall be effective from and after the date of its passage and publication as required by law.
