Cattle receipts: 1,334 head. Interest in all classes continued high and prices generally were stronger than a week ago. Fancy quality stock steer calves topped at 24.10 on some reputation brand cattle, choice kinds were selling from 22.25 to 23.50 with a lot of these kinds in the run.

Heifer calves gained a little of last week's loss and bulked from 17.50 to 18.50. A load of 355-lb. Angus went at 18.35 and several packages of choice Herefords brought 18.00 or better. Plainier kinds from 16.00-17.25 cwt.

Light yearling top of the day went to a Boyd county consignment averaging 540 lbs. at 23.80, another large consignment drew a 22.50 cwt. bid and these averaged 560 lbs. Short yearling heifers weighing 530 lbs. topped at 18.50. The bulk of a short supply sold between 15.50-16.75.

Weightier cattle were scarce. Had a nice run of breeding cows. 22 head Bangs tested 3-yr.-old Hereford heifers topped at \$182.00 per head. Some other good kinds brought around \$140-\$145. Breeding cows with a little age still commanded a good price—from \$125-\$135 per head.

The butcher cow market continued strong, particularly on the plainier kinds. The canner and cutter kinds, mainly 9.75-10.50—beef cows mostly 10.75-12.25. Bologna bulls were about 1.00 cwt. higher, mostly \$10.50-\$13.10 cwt.
