Highway Engineer's Son Crash Victim

William Crook Dies Near Long Pine

William B. Crook, 19, of Ainsworth, son of J. M. Crook, formerly of Meadow Grove and Neigh, was killed Saturday night when the car in which he was riding went through a guard rail on U.S. highway 20 near Long Pine.

Funeral services were conducted at 10:30 a.m., Tuesday from a funeral home in Ainsworth.

The youth's father is district engineer for the Nebraska department of roads and irrigation and is well-known in Holt county. The youth, a former Ainsworth high and University of Nebraska student, has played considerable basketball and football against Holt county teams.

Investigating officers said the car went through a guard rail and struck a concrete bridge abutment at an intersection of highways 20 and 55. Richard Kreyck, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Kreyck of Ainsworth, the driver, and James O'Halloran, 17, son of Mrs. Doris O'Halloran, another passenger, were injured. They suffered from cuts and bruises.

The death raised Nebraska's highway fatality toll for the year to 51 as compared to 24 at this time in 1953.

It was the first fatality in Brown county since September 26, 1942.

J. D. Osenbaugh, Leo Carney, George Van Every, Frank Eppembach and Thomas Schober, all of O'Neill, attended the funeral.

Survivors include: Parents—Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Crook; brother—Pvt. Donald Crook, serving in the army in Texas. Private Crook went to Ainsworth for the funeral.
