State Legislature to Convene

Jan. 3; May be Toughest Session

By Melvin Paul Statehouse Correspondent The Nebraska Press Association LINCOLN-The 1961 Nebraska Legislature opens January 3 for what probably will be a six months stand. Pre-session indications are that there might not be a record number of bills introduced, but because of some of the problems confronting the lawmakers, they could possibly set a new length record.

Controversial subjects up will be reapportionment of Congressional and Legislative districts, broadening of the tax base and the related problem of state spending. Coupled with those will be whether to reform the Board of Control which governs state institutions by changing its structure and whether this would achieve more efficiency.


A group of senators is forming that has in mind a critical look at state spending, including appropriations for the University of Nebraska and the four teachers colleges at Wayne, Chadron, Peru and Kearney

Governor-elect Frank Morrison says he feels the University's request for 22 per cent more tax money for the 1961-63 biennium, some \$5 million more, is "not too far out of line." Morrison says he wouldn't favor much trimming since he feels it is the responsibility of the elected members of the Board of Regents to run the University. "One place where we cannot afford sacrifice is education," Morrison said.

New Officers

Governor-elect Frank Morrison named the bulk of his cabinet level appointments before the Christmas holiday. They included George Morris of Lincoln as State Purchasing Agent; Robert C. Newell of Lincoln as Superintendent of Statehouse and its grounds; Frank J. Barrett, Insurance Commissioner; Joseph Divis, Fire Marshal, and Forrest Johnson as Tax Commissioner.

Morrison moved slowly on the appointments stating he wanted to



get the best men possible for the job. One of those named was a Republican. He is Morris, who formerly was superintendent of the men's reformatory in Lincoln and for the past few years was superintendent of schools at Walton, near Lincoln.

Fire Rules

A meeting is slated January 12 on the controversial fire rules which affect state institutions and schools in Nebraska. The fire marshal's rules com-

mittee will discuss whether to reconsider some of the proposals, many of which have brought strong protests as being too difficult to comply with.

School men have said one of the problems is that fire inspectors contradict each other and schools never know where they stand. Gov. Dwight Burney recommended the rules be restudied in view of the widespread complaint about them. He said he was not necessarily suggesting the

rules be changed. Proposed by the school people was a revision of statutes limiting power of the fire marshal providing an advisory board and with both responsible to the governor. The school people also suggested that changes in the state fire code be made by the Legislature and that a statewide fire insurance plan for schools be adopted

Billboard Fight

The problem of billboards along the interstate highway apparently will come up again in the 1961 Legislature. State Sen. Otto Liebers if Lincoln says states will have until next July 1 to enact legislation regulating billboards along the super highway to entitle them to federal bonus payments on interstate construction. Liebers heads a committee that will press for billboard regulation laws in the next legislature. The problem cropped up in the 1959 Unicameral but proposed legislation was defeated. To carry out the billboard regulations the state would be required to prohibit them in the area 660 feet on each side of the highway.

Aeronautics Commission

The State Aeronautics Commission had a lukewarm attitude about a statement issued by Frontier Airlines. The airlines said it wants to be an "eager" carrier Dec. 29 - 30 - 31 in Nebraska and then outlined its position on various segments
