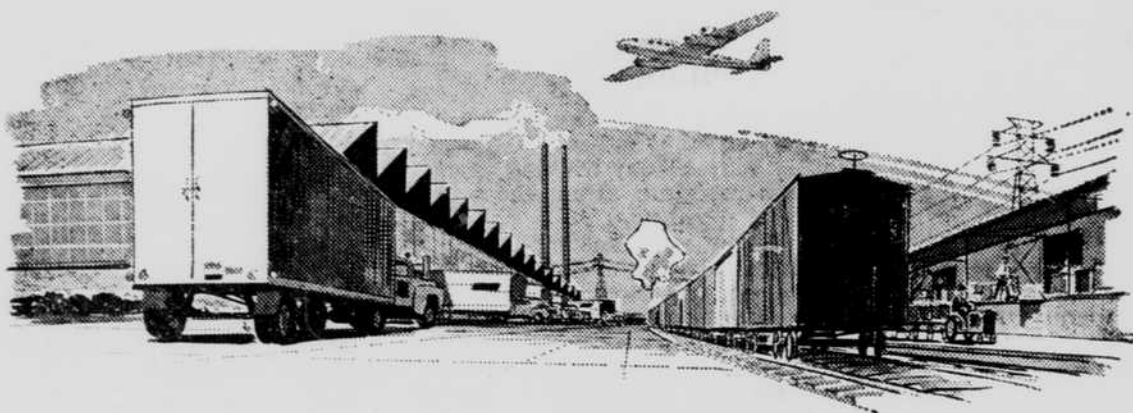

**INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT**

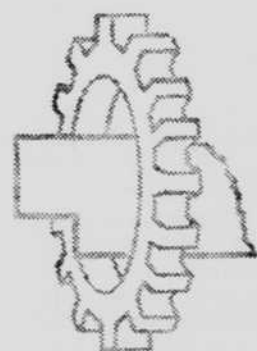


The recent passage of the Industrial Development Amendment . . . increased promotional activities on every hand, from the state level right down through the smallest communities . . . all underscore Nebraska's determination to balance its agricultural economy with an expanded industrial economy.
