## Eagles Hand Neligh High 64-53 Loss

O'Neill High, rated ninth in the State in class 'B' competition, won their seventh game of the season Tuesday night over Neligh 64-53.

The Eagles got off to a 15-11 first quarter lead, despite poor ball handling and weak rebounding. Sharp shooting from the floor and an effective defense, although somewhat erratic at times, kept the home team Eagles in front the first half 36-19.

The varsity filled out the third quarter and compiled a 53-29 lead for the reserves to work on in the final eight minutes. Bothered by a press, the second team failed to score in the first three minutes of the final quarter, but then came through with 11 points to preserve their lead and chalk up the victory. For the second straight game all varsity boys suiting up for O'Neill saw action.

Sophomore Rich Hill led the varsity's scoring with 13 points, and Ron Schmiedel, John Kurtz, and Jerry Dexter followed with 12 apiece. Dexter hit 6 of 8 shots from the floor. Neligh's scoring was led by Korshoj with 21.

The Eagles' next game will be January 16th in the Holt County Tournament. The first-seeded

Eagles will take on the Tigers of Inman at 8:45 in the final game of the evening.

## U. S. Air Force Making Use of New Methods of Survival Tactics

Lieut. Duane Thorin, USN, author of the book, "The Ride to Panunjom," and well known in the O'Neill area, may someday be responsible for the survival of United States Air Force personnel. At Stead Air Force base, Nevada in a desert surrounded by the Sierra Nevada, Air Force men are being taught how to survive if ever captured or tortured, and also how to live following a crash or bail-out.

All the physical surrounding of the prison camp, where Thorin survived 19 months imprisonment, have been re-created and the men are being taught to resist such horrors as brainwashing and torture.

Thorin was born near Clearwater, graduated from Neligh high school and lived many years of his life near Ewing. He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Thorin of Chambers and a brother of Ed Thorin of O'Neill.

He wrote a sequel in pamphlet form about two years ago and persons who have read this pamphlet, report that the author has accurately predicted many conditions which are present today.
