### O'Neill Eagles Clip Pierce 58-52; Enter Rangeland Tourney Tonight

An even-scoring O'Neill High team won their eleventh game of the season Friday night as they defeated the Pierce Bluejays 58-52.

Ron Schmeichel led the winners with 15 points, followed by Jerry Dexter with 14. Rich Hill had 13 and John Kurtz had 11.

The home team Eagles got off to an 18-9 first quarter lead, but at this point the Bluejays applied an all-court press. Despite the loss of the ball on several occasions, O'Neill used well developed offensive maneuvers to establish a 36-25 half time lead. Dexter led the Eagles' first half scoring with 12 points.

In the third quarter a tighter Pierce defense held the Eagles to only five points but O'Neill still managed a 41-33 lead going into the final quarter as they displayed some fine defense themselves.

With the help of Rich Hill's 9 points in the final period and Ron Schmeichel's 7, the Eagles fought off a late drive by the Bluejays and wound up on the victor's end of the final 58-52 score.

Leading the way for the visitors was Larry Hoefener with 14 points. The Bluejays collected 14 points on free throws as they hit 88 per cent from the charity line.

The Eagles' next game will be in the NCCNC (now Rangeland) Tournament at Ainsworth tonight. O'Neill will take on the Ainsworth Bulldogs at 7 p.m. Bassett and Valentine meet at 8:30.

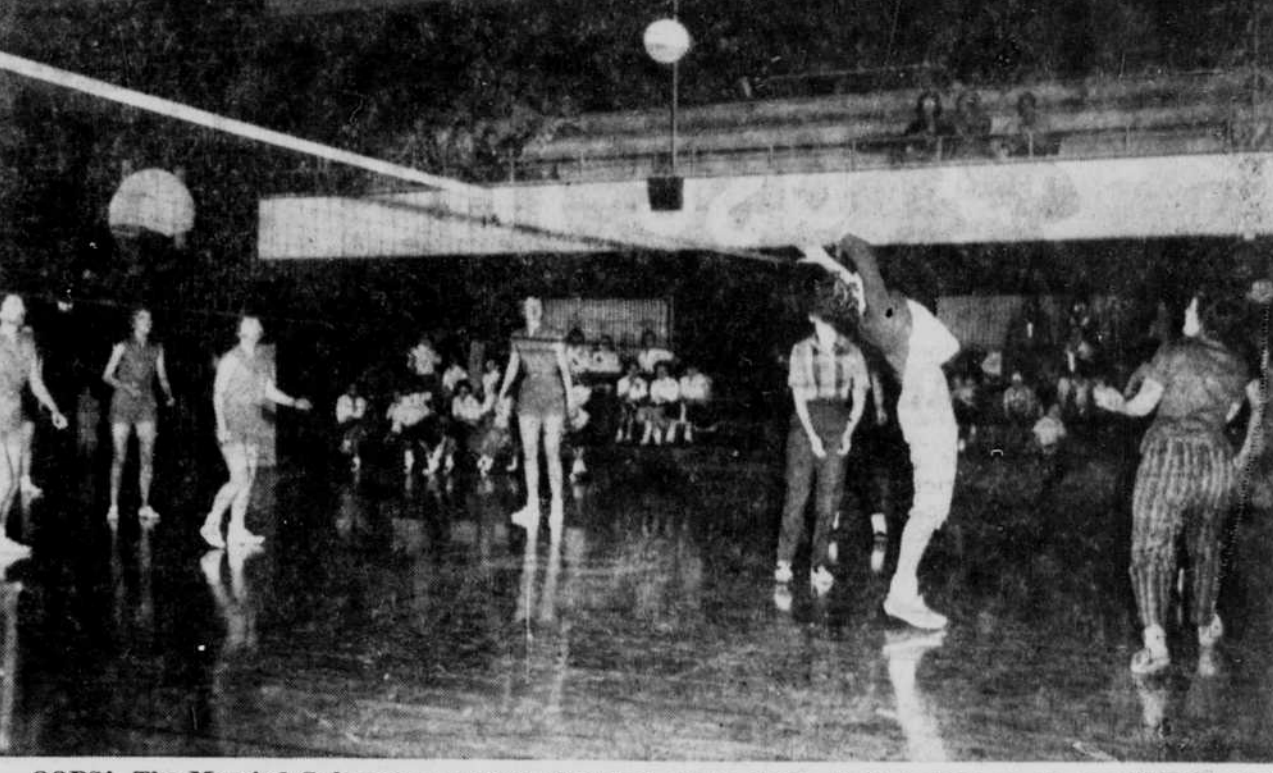

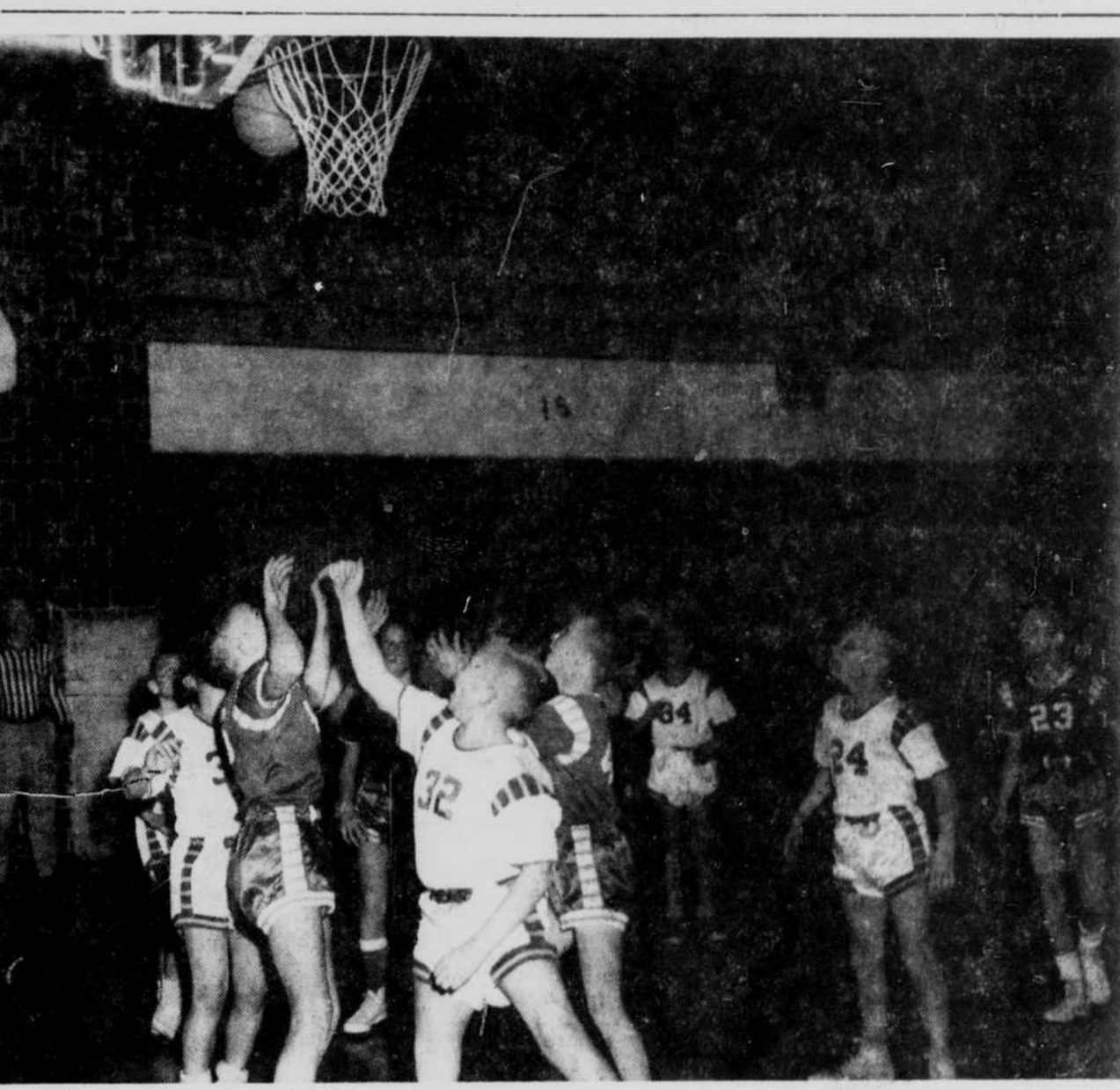
