Mrs. Walter Pucket entered Atkinson Memorial hospital Monday.

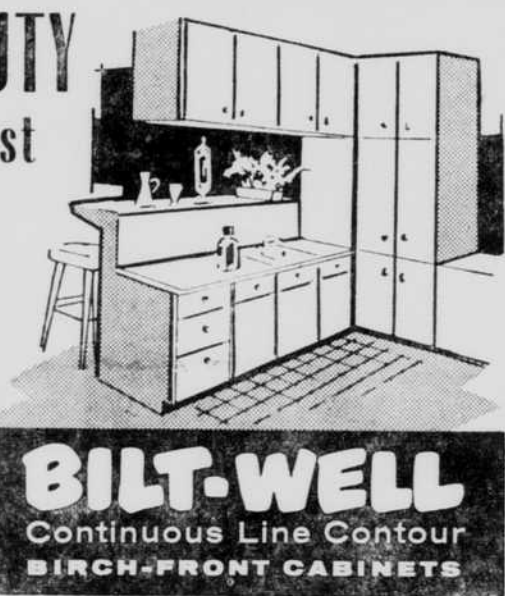
