Different colors can be used for different parts of walls - one color for the lower part to band the furniture together, and another (usually lighter) to bring light and space above.

One wall can be painted a color to harmonize or contrast with the color on the other three walls or an indentation or bay can be painted differently from the major walls.

The trim around doors and windows, and the baseboard are sometimes painted a darker value of the same hue used on the walls, very rarely a different color.

Stencils can be used around a window to take the place of draperies, where wall meets ceiling, or wherever else they are needed.

Murals can be painted directly on the wall or on canvas which is then fastened to it. For these you need an artist, unless you can live with your own art.

**Homemakers
Corner . . .**

Spring is just around the corner. With the coming of spring many homemakers begin thinking about redecorating.

Since paint is the easiest of finishes to apply, it has led many into doing their own redecorating job. Nothing puts life back into dreary quarters quite so quickly and inexpensively. Courage in one hand and a brush or roller in the other is all you need to bring a dingy room out of the dumps by painting the walls with lively colors.

With paint, you can dictate the exact color. Next in importance is paint's ability to give a smooth, even surface to whatever it covers. If smooth painting will not cover blemishes, stippling or spattering will minimize blemishes in the walls or ceilings. Pronounced textures are produced with special thick texture paints. This type of paint can be used to cover plaster cracks or wall-board joints. It can also give texture to walls.

Although it is customary to paint all wall surfaces in one room the same color and then leave them alone, variations are
