Governor Plans Series of Forums As Part of Promote Nebr. Drive

The Nebraska Press Association LINCOLN—Matters of public concern will be aired in Nebraska over the coming two years by a variety of top-level individuals. They will be brought to Nebraska by Gov. Frank Morrison for a series of what he terms "Heartland Forums."

The purpose of these meetings, the governor says, is to "awaken the people to the problems we are all concerned with and some suggestions on their solution." Morrison says these are part of his program to develop Nebraska. Already the chief executive has held a "breadbasket conference," and a "food for peace" meeting.

Lt. Gen. Alfred Trudeau, the president at a personal conference with him in Washington but the nation's chief executive isn't accepting speaking engagements with Congress in session and cannot advise him now whether he can visit Nebraska. Also as part of his promote Nebraska drive, the governor wants to attract foreign visitors, and expand development of parks and natural resources. Morrison says the president has expressed enthusiasm

for his development plans.

Obbink Resignation
The resignation of State Aeronautics Director Jack Obbink cut off what could have been one of the most intense scraps in the Legislature in many sessions. There was considerable sentiment being built up over the appointment of Obbink by Gov. Frank Morrison.

Some legislators were glad the director's name would not come before the Unicameral for confirmation because of the ruckus that would have resulted.

Those close to the administration of the governor were concerned about the repercussions from a political fight in the Legislature and what this would do to the cordial relations the governor has maintained with the senators.

Obbink announced he resigned purely for reasons that he could better himself in a federal position in Washington. The governor praised the director's contribution to Nebraska aviation but said he would not stand in the way of anyone who could improve his position. Morrison and Obbink are Democrats. Obbink was fired by Republican Gov. Dwight Burney, now presiding officer of the Legislature and lieutenant governor, but appointed again by Morrison when he took office. Approval of the Legislature is required for appointments by the governor.

Stole Cars
The always touchy problem of use of state cars is getting attention under the administration of Gov. Frank Morrison. Morrison and State Auditor Ray Johnson

have an agreement that if the auditor finds anything questionable in this area or any other the governor would be notified.

Last month, Morrison issued a directive to department heads reminding them that under law state cars cannot be used for personal business and pleasure. The problem of state cars came up this week in connection with questions raised by Johnson over travel expense for Harold Peterson, vice-chairman of the Board of Control which governs state institutions, and Mrs. Ethel Kirwin, board member.

In a regular audit of the board, Johnson said there were duplicate expense accounts submitted by the two board members, largely involving vouchers for gasoline automobile mileage, airplane rental and meals and lodging.

The two members said any duplications were "strictly unintentional."

Legislative Controversy
Controversy in the Legislature over pending legislation is going to pick up in coming weeks in the eyes of veteran observers.

The lawmakers, who have been quietly and efficiently handling legislation to date are getting into the "Big Bertha" bills that will provoke heavy discussion on the floor, and before committees. These included the problems of a broadened tax base and legislative and Congressional redistricting.

Sen. Don Thompson of McCook, speaker of the Legislature, has been working to speed up action of the senators. He is periodically comparing their progress with the 1959 session and urging them to increase the tempo.

There are 15 new senators, regarded by veteran observers and lobbyists, too, as a high caliber group of men. Observers say these members give careful attention to legislation. However, the budget committee and some of the other standing groups, are ahead of schedule.

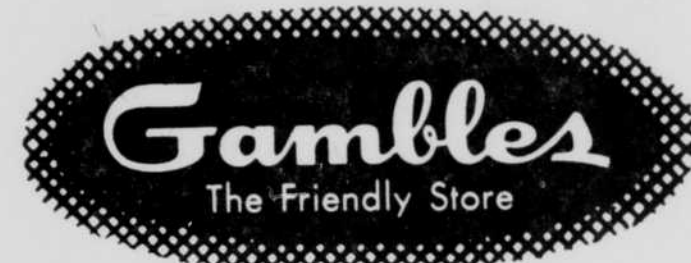
