Report from Washington

The House Rules Committee on July 18th killed the three major education bills. One of these bills provided for assistance to school construction and teacher's salaries at the public and elementary level; the second bill provided for construction at the college level, plus 25,000 scholarships each year; and the third bill was the National Defense Education Act, which was a general catch-all bill covering everything, including loans to private and parochial schools.

You will recall that at the insistence of the Administration, the Rules Committee was increased in total membership from 12 to 15 by a very close vote last January. The composition of the Committee is presently ten Democrats and five Republicans. Consequently, with the Democrats firmly in control of this Committee, the blame for the killing of these bills must rest on their shoulders.

Stories coming out of Washington that the Republicans are to blame for this action simply are not true, as the above are the facts in the situation.

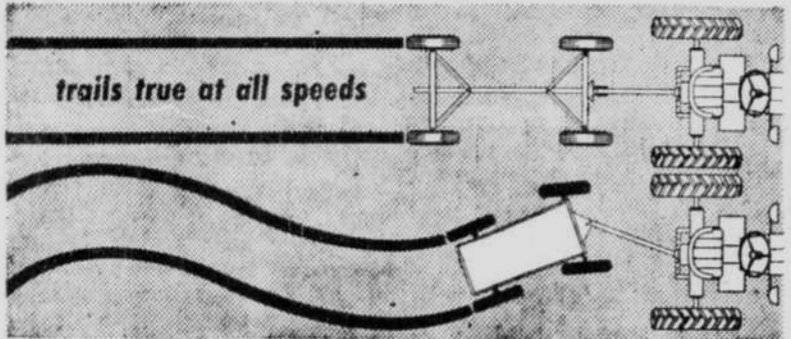
All of these domestic issues, however, pale into insignificance in comparison with the serious situation which this country faces in Berlin and other trouble spots in the world. The President's address to the Nation on July 25th leaves no doubt about the seriousness of the situation in regard to our fight against Communism, and I applaud the President's speech.

I urge that all American citizens back the President 100% in this fight against the tyrannical forces of Communism. I will support the \$2 1/2 billion increase in the budget for the military which the President requested. Our position in Berlin is right and I would differ with the President in that I feel that there is no room for negotiation insofar as the Berlin situation is concerned. I approve of his closing the front door to the Communist threat in Berlin, but at the same time, we must make sure that the back door is not left ajar, which we are doing at the present time by our lack of action in regard to Cuba. We simply cannot allow Com-

munist to take hold in the Western Hemisphere. We must be just as firm and aggressive in regard to this danger as we are in regard to the Berlin situation.

The recent action of Mr. Castro in regard to the Eastern Airlines Electra puts us in a very embarrassing position. We should immediately demand the return of this plane within 24 hours, and make it clear that, if necessary, we intend to go over and get it by force. This is all part of the world wide Communist conspiracy and must be considered and dealt with as such.

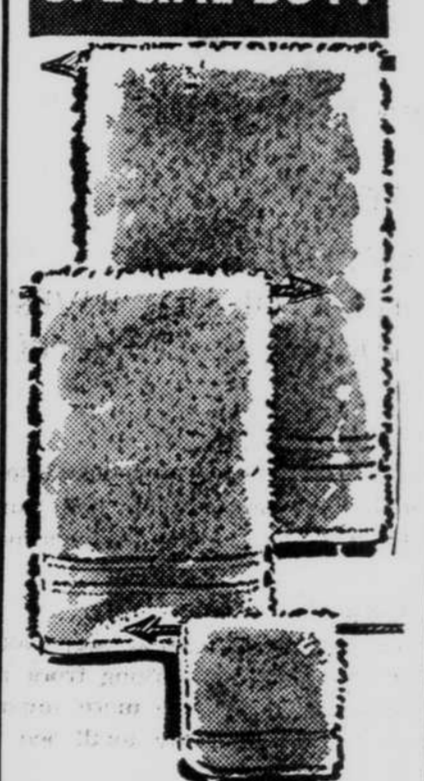
