### Land Bank Has Highest Volume in 44 Years

The Federal Land Bank of Omaha reached the highest volume in its 44-year history early this month, according to Lyle P. Dierks, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of O'Neill.

Land Bank President Thomas A. Maxwell Jr., in a report to the local association, stated that more than \$401 million in long-term loans are outstanding to 48,000 farmers and ranchers in Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota and Wyoming.

The Land Bank has experienced continuous growth since early 1919 when the \$150 million outstanding was recorded. The previous peak was reached on March 1, 1938, under very different conditions, Maxwell's report noted.

"Farmers were then trying to recover from double digit estate mortgage loans in Boyd, Holt, Garfield and Wheeler counties, now has \$6,645,000.00 in loans outstanding, Dierks reported.

O'Neill's association is one of 107 in the four-state area which own the Federal Land Bank of Omaha. The associations, in turn, are owned by the farmers and ranchers who borrow from them.

Frank C. Krumtorad, Ewing, is president of the O'Neill FLBA, and Wilbur Moon, Stuart, is vice president. Other directors include Emmet J. Revell, O'Neill, Ralph Hoffman, Ewing, and Don Kehn, Butte.
