New Supply House Erected at Royal Trout Rearing Ponds

ROYAL — The Nebraska State Game, Fish and Forestation Commission has finished the erection of a supply storing house at the State Fish Rearing station three and one-half miles northeast of Royal where 8 1/2 tons of fish feed may be stored, and other needed supplies.

Before the erection of the building, the custodian, Fish Culturist Irvin Bray, had to make daily trips to Royal to get the feed.

The trailer commission recently had a St. Louis house moved to the site for Mr. and Mrs. Bray who had been staying at Orchard because of lack of housing facilities in Royal. Mr. Bray stated that the Commission plans to build a residence for them next summer since this is to be their permanent home.

The fish rearing ponds are attracting considerable attention, and there are daily visitors, many going to be present at two o'clock in the afternoon when Mr. O'Bray feeds the fish.

Asked about the feeding, Mr. Bray said, "Every ounce of feed must be weighed and the amount recorded on a Food Conservation sheet on which is tabulated the pounds of food per pound of fish gain; food cost per pound of fish gain; per cent gain in weight of fish; food fed in percent of body weight.

There are two trout rearing ponds, 80 x 20, five feet deep, in the area, and there are 15 more to be constructed making 17 in all, said Mr. Bray. These ponds are to be in series of four. It is expected that work will begin this fall on the additional ponds.

Mr. Bray has been in the employ of the Commission for 30 years. He and his wife and two sons lived at Rock Creek for 21 years.

It may be well to state that fishing in the rearing ponds is forbidden, but may be indulged in the stream above or below the ponds.
