spectators are on the grounds. It is hoped that the fencing will arrive in time for the project to be finished before winter.

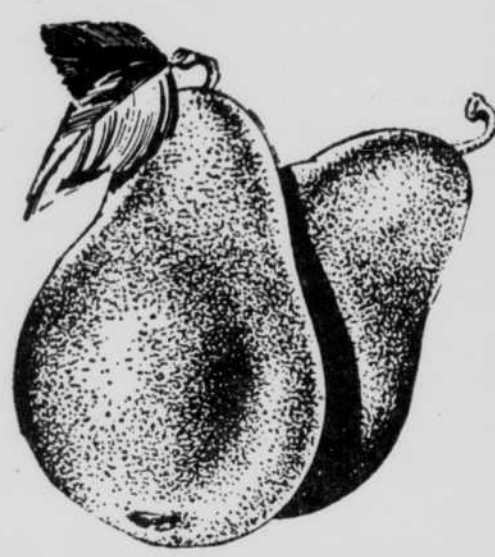
WSCS was scheduled to meet with Mrs. Elmer Lichty Wednesday of this week.
