Auction, Bargains Draw Big Crowd

The highly-advertised Lloyd Collins Implements machinery auction and the citywide bargain day merchandise event attracted a big crowd Saturday. It was snowing early Saturday but the sun broke through to beckon people to O'Neill from a considerable distance despite a cold wind.

Mr. Collins reported Saturday's crowd was "considerably larger" than the first machinery auction he staged in November, 1949. Prices on many items—including some reconditioned tractors—were "very good," but prices generally were not as high as during the first sale 3 months ago.

Automobile parking space was at a premium within several blocks of the sale site, near the Seger Oil & Transport Co. on the east outskirts of the city. Col. Edwin Thorin, of Chambers, and Col. Clifford Nelson, of Oakland, were the auctioneers, assisted by Col. E. C. Weller, of Atkinson, O'Neill National bank was clerk.

A minor aircraft accident detracted from the sale about 5 p. m. Gail Doran, of Elgin, and a passenger attempted to take-off from the sale site. Without leaving the ground they crashed through a fence, tearing off the landing gear, breaking the propeller and damaging the fence. They were unhurt.

Longtime Inman Resident Dies

Funeral services were conducted in the chapel of Biglin Bros. funeral home here Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock for Ferdinand Krutz, 78. Rev. V. R. Bell conducted the rites and burial was at Prospect Hill cemetery. Krutz died Wednesday, February 22.
