

Mrs. G. A. Stannard, Former Resident, Named San Diego's 'Volunteer of Month'

Mrs. G. A. Stannard, of San Diego, Calif., nee Catherine King, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clyde King, of O'Neill, was heralded as the "Volunteer of the Month" in a recent issue of the San Diego Tribune-Sun.

The paper stated: "Reading in local newspapers about the Volunteer Bureau's recruitment drive for new volunteer workers, Mrs. G. A. Stannard, who had the spare time, decided to help. And, because for 18 months she has proved such a valuable worker, today Mrs. Stannard is being honored by the Volunteer Bureau as 'Volunteer of the Month'."

"Mrs. Stannard worked one day a week for 3 months at the Children's convalescent hospital, entertaining the children. She then was placed in a job for the Community Chest, driving the president of Big Sister league to meetings. Through her association with the Big Sister league, Mrs. Stannard has been elected treasurer. She is much inspired by the work of the Community Chest agency which offers valuable assistance to transients.

"Beginning next month, Mrs. Stannard will add another day a week to her volunteer routine when she will work in the office at County hospital as dispatcher for the new driving group being organized to transport patients to and from the hospital.

"A native of Moline, Ill., the former Catherine King is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clyde King, of O'Neill, Nebr., where her family moved when she was 6-years-old. Mrs. Stannard attended St. Mary's academy and the University of Nebraska where she affiliated with Kappa Alpha Theta. She later studied in Chicago Art Institute.

"Mrs. Stannard has one brother, Arthur M. King, who makes his home in Phoenix.

"Mr. and Mrs. Stannard were married in O'Neill and moved to San Diego 20 years ago to make their home. Mr. Stannard has long been active in welfare work, at present is on the executive board of the San Diego Cancer society. The Stannards have one daughter, Lynn, 19, a student in University of California at Davis.

"In discussing her own experience with volunteer work, Mrs. Stannard said that she has enjoyed it so much that she recommends volunteer work to everyone with any free time."

Walter Soulek Takes Own Life

VERDEL — Walter Soulek, 44, prominent Verdel stockman and rancher, was found dead Sunday, March 5, immediately south of his Knox county farm home. He died from shotgun wounds in the head.

County Attorney Burns, who investigated, stated that Soulek took his own life and left a note in the house telling his family where to find the body. The family was away at church at the time.

Soulek was widely known as a stockman and at times, in the past, had shipped cattle from Verdel by the train load. Funeral services were planned Wednesday and burial was to be in the Verdel cemetery. Survivors include: Widow — Elita; sons—Kent and Donald; 2 daughters; mother; brother — Albert; 2 sisters.

One brother, Andrew, a Niobrara druggist, preceded him in death.
