water and well drained. Roll into fine crumbs one-half gram crackers and add 1 teaspoon cinnamon, one-fourth teaspoon each nutmeg, cloves, allspice and salt, 1 cup nuts, 2 tablespoons each of orange peel candied cherries and citron. Add the other ingredients and mix well. Pack in a greased mold and chill for 2 weeks.

CHOCOLATE APPLE SAUCE CAKE

One cup sugar, one-half cup shortening, one and one-half cups of unsweetened apple sauce, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon vanilla, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one-half cup nuts, 2 cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 3 tablespoons cocoa. Cream shortening, vanilla and sugar, egg and salt well. Add apple sauce and beat well, then dry ingredients which have been sifted together and lastly the nuts. Bake in moderate oven 25 minutes. Delicious served with whipped cream.

"CONSTANT READER."

Dear Blanche: Although I am not gifted as a writer, I thought I would like to write you. I always read your column in The Frontier Woman and Lines From a Little House in the World-Herald. When I read them I always think my home isn't so different from other people's. Blanche has the same ups and downs in her home that I have.

I will pass on a couple ideas that I use which save me time and maybe some other homemaker will profit by them. I take a cookie sheet and put under the rack in my Skelgas oven when I bake a berry pie or a cobbler that might boil over and onto the oven. The cookie sheet is easily taken out and cleaned off and the oven is kept nice and clean.

In making baking powder biscuits or cobbler crust, I use either waxed paper or the inside of a bread wrapper to pat out the dough on. This saves cleaning a messy molding board.

I will also enclose a cookie recipe which I use very much. I gave this recipe to my sister-in-law with 4 youngsters and she says they really go for these cookies in a big way. She baked them in the 2 older ones for school lunches.

OATMEAL CRISPIES
One cup shortening, 1 cup la, one and one-half cups flour, 2 beaten eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, one and one-half cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 3 cups oatmeal. Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar, add eggs and vanilla, beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients, add oatmeal. Mix well. Chocolate chips, nutmeats or raisins may now be added. The raisins should be soaked in a little hot water first. Shape into rolls and chill. Slice in sheet in moderate oven of 350 F. for 10 minutes. Children, of course, like the chocolate chips the best and one package will make two batches of cookies.
