The 5 lettermen who brace the cinder team are: Ted Lindberg, hurdles and high jump; Don Beckwith, 440-yard dash; Don Calkins, sprints and broad jump; Claude Cole, hurdles, and Don Kloppenberg, mile, discus and shotput.

Outside practice today has been limited and most of the time has been spent in classroom sessions and viewing training films. Wednesday, the candidates saw a film concerning high jumping and pole vaulting.

With less than 3 weeks remaining before the opening track meet, Miller said some of the promising track candidates include:

The "half blue" and "full blue" standard is an award given by the University of Nebraska if a track team member scores sufficient points in relation to times and distances of particular events.

"Half blue," a half diamond shaped emblem with the year encribed, is awarded if a prep track team member scores 12 points in various events.

"Full blue," full diamond shape; numeral with the year encribed, is awarded if 24 points are scored. All points are totaled at the end of a season, toward the award.
