ROADS DOMINATE CHAMBER MEET

U. S. 20 and Farm-to-Market Highways Draw Attention

The everlasting road topic dominated Tuesday's meeting of the Chamber of Commerce at which 22 members were present.

Most of the discussion surrounded U. S. highway 20 and the progress of the new highway 20 association, and some discussion was carried on in connection with certain farm-to-market roads, notably the Opportunity road and a proposed improvement in Grattan, Emmet and Sheridan townships.

President Melvin Ruzicka presided. A. P. Jaskowiak reported on the Holt county athletic banquet and James W. Rooney, secretary, made a report on the Nebraska Stock Growers' sectional meeting. Both were given votes of thanks for successful conduct of both affairs. Rooney also read the Chamber's financial statement and announced that new officers will be elected at the June meeting.

Until Tuesday O'Neill (like Atkinson, Stuart and several other points) had not actively participated in the formation of the new U. S. Highway 20 association.

President Ruzicka was instructed to appoint a committee to formulate a Highway 20 chapter here. Expected to take a lead in the move will be highway service stations, hotel, cabin camp, cafe and garage operators.

Dues are based on population of the town at 10-cents per capita. Eric G. DeFon, of Chadron, is president and Chet Allen, also of Chadron, is secretary.

Dr. W. F. Finley reviewed the highway 20 story from its beginning until the present day.

New association plans to establish a travel bureau in Sioux City to induce tourists and other traffic over the route. Fifty thousand maps will be printed. No money is being expended until the total budget is raised.

Possibility of development of a farm-to-market road west 9 miles from the Andy Clark place was discussed. This would include 1 mile in Grattan township, 6 miles in Emmet township and 2 miles in Sheridan township.

Next meeting will feature an election of officers. Terms expiring are those of: president—Melvin Ruzicka; first vice-president—Ed Wilson; second vice-president—L. M. Diehlman; treasurer—J. B. Grady; directors—William McIntosh and J. L. McCarville, jr.

The May meeting was in the form of a noon luncheon at Slat's cafe.
