Iowa Tourists Remember O'Neill Because of Courtesy Shown During Stop-Overs

Hi there, folks!

During the warm May days which are a sunny prelude to soaring summer temperatures, salad plates are always welcome, especially a lunch. You know that if you have a man around the house, these salads must be filling and satisfying. The durum wheat family, macaroni, spaghetti and noodles happily come to your rescue on such occasions.

These wheat foods, important for their protein and food energy, have such a bland flavor and firm chewy texture that they are perfect as the foundations for main dish salads. Macaroni, spaghetti and noodles make quick friends with all kinds of seafoods, tuna, salmon, crab or shrimp. Vegetables in variety as well as many tart fruits also make happy companions to any one of the durum wheat threesome. As always, the macaroni family unobtrusively takes the background and lets one of the more highly seasoned foods do the flavoring job.

Many folks like at least one hot dish with their meal. With chilled macaroni salads, serve tart Harvard beets or any one of the family's favorite green vegetables such as fresh asparagus, whole green beans, broccoli or peas.

In addition to a hot vegetable, you will like crisp relishes, pickles and sliced tomatoes. Include a basket of bread sticks or enriched rolls with butter or margarine and your meal is complete.

Macaroni ham salad has cubes of ham to give it a good meaty

flavor, celery and green pepper for pleasing crunchiness and little maaroni shells to form the agreeable base. A mixture of mayonnaise and vinegar, seasoned with minced onion, salt and mustard blends all the ingredients together.

MACARONI HAM SALAD
Six ounces shell macaroni, one and one-half cups cubed cooked ham, one-half cup diced celery, one-fourth cup chopped green pepper, one tablespoon minced ham, three-fourths cup mayonnaise, one tablespoon vinegar, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon prepared mustard.

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender (about 8 minutes). Drain and rinse. While macaroni is cooking, combine ham, celery, and green pepper. Add macaroni. Mix onion, mayonnaise, vinegar, salt and prepared mustard and fold into ham mixture. Chill thoroughly. Serve on chilled salad plate garnished with waterress and tomato slices, if desired. Makes 4 servings.

Dear Mrs. Pease:

I have just been reading the March 9 issue of The Frontier, which was sent to us from relatives in Nebraska, and noticed your column so decided to write you a letter.

Having been a resident of Holt county for 29 years and a teacher in Holt and Boyd county schools for 10 years, I always enjoy reading a copy of The Frontier.

My family and I were especially interested in this March 9 issue as it gave us so much information concerning the late blizzard. Our winter in southeast Iowa was rather mild and without much snow. Even at that we were growing very anxious to get out to grass!

My family includes 2 daughters, one 8-years-old and the other 7. At present they are undergoing a siege of the red

measles. And are they red!

Claudia, the oldest, is pretty well over them but Carol is just at the miserable stage. The girls attend school in the town of Keswick from which we are 1 mile north. A bus picks them up at our door around 8:30 a.m., and drops them off home again about 3:45 p.m. I feel this is much more convenient than getting out around 7 or 7:30 a.m. on cold frosty mornings, saddling a pony and riding 2 1/2 miles to school, as their mother used to do.

MRS. CHURCHILL'S LADY BALTIMORE CAKE

One and one-half cups sugar, one-half cup shortening, one cup water (cold), 3 cups sifted flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, pinch of salt, 4 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Cream sugar and butter. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Add water and flour to the sugar and shortening and beat well, 100 strokes with a spoon or 2 minutes with electric mixer. Add eggs and beat again. Last add vanilla and beat again. Pour in three 9-inch round cake pans and bake at 370 F. for 15 minutes.

It may be some housewife is interested in step - savers as I have been. When my children were young, I wasn't strong, I had no conveniences to make my work lighter, so it was up to me to do the best I could. I planned ways to save unnecessary steps, articles that were to be taken up stairs were put on the landing, or on the lower step with the understanding the first member of the family going up would carry them to the top of the stairs.

The freshly laundered clothes were placed in a basket, set on the landing till one of the larger members would take them up where all would await a convenient time for me to put them in their places.

If the noon meal was ready to be eaten when the children came in from school, there was ample time for the dishes to be washed and dried before they returned to school, each child carried his own soiled dishes to the kitchen.
