Bids Are Sought for Extensive Repair on Headquarters

Consumers Public Power district is advertising for bids on construction and materials necessary for rebuilding and modernizing its O'Neill district office.

According to L. C. Walling, O'Neill district manager, the building will be extended to the alley in the rear to provide necessary store room and service space at the downtown location. Office space will also be rearranged so that the accounting department and engineering department will be provided with offices on the second floor and the sales floor and other department facilities will also be completely modernized.

Mr. Walling said the building will be completely equipped with modern facilities throughout, including modern fluorescent lighting and other fixtures for the convenience of customers and for greatest efficiency of the operating staff and a new modern glass front will be installed on the main street and the entrance changed.

Mr. Walling said through this arrangement, Consumers offices will occupy both the first and second floors of the west side of the present building and that the second floor of the east side will be built into office space.
