years. In 1933 it was moved to the Shanner farm where it is now used as a farm building.

During the pastorate of Rev. L. M. McGaughey, which began in 1921, additional land was purchased and a stucco parsonage was begun. It was not completed, however, until the pastorate of Rev. H. T. Todd, which began in 1924.

The old parsonage was sold to John Kennedy and was moved to his farm, where it became part of a residence.

Since that time a program of repair and improvement has been carried on in both the church and the parsonage. Several years ago a large picture of "Christ in Gethsemane" was hung on the front wall of the church within the sanctuary as a memorial to Mr. Blain and other pioneers, who, in spite of hardships, strove toward a vision which has been fulfilled.
