

WILLIAM HAYNES DIES IN WYOMING

Former Page Resident
Leaves 6 Sons and
3 Daughters

PAGE — Funeral services for William T. Haynes, 82, a former farm resident of this community, were conducted Monday afternoon, May 29, at 2:30 o'clock in Torrington, Wyo.

Rev. George Wood, pastor of the Ft. Laramie Presbyterian church, officiated.

The late Mr. Haynes died at the Torrington hospital Saturday evening, May 27. Death was attributed to a stroke he suffered by a week earlier followed by a second stroke the day before he succumbed.

At the funeral service a soloist, with an organ accompanist, sang "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Rock of Ages." Burial was in the Valley View cemetery in Torrington.

William Thomas, eldest son of Greenbeary and Sarah Haynes, was born January 20, 1868 at Hopedale, Ill.

When he was in his early teens, the family moved to Cumming county, Nebraska. Next year they moved to a homestead north of O'Neill. In 1886 he was married to Miss Adda Agnes Johnson at the home of her parents north of O'Neill. To this union 4 children were born. The eldest son, Delmer, passed away at the age of 6 months. The others are Bert, Mrs. Amos (Pearl) Scott, and Allen.

Mrs. Haynes died in the spring of 1894. Mr. Haynes' parents then joined him to help care for the children. In 1896 they moved to the Page vicinity.

On February 22, 1899, he was united in marriage to Miss Malinda Ord, of Page. To them 2 children were born. They are Clarence and Mrs. R. A. (Leona) White.

Mr. and Mrs. Haynes farmed near Page for about 20 years before going to Wyoming where they lived on a homestead north of Ft. Laramie for several years. In the early years of their retirement from the farm, Mr. Haynes took over the duties as custodian of the Ft. Laramie public school and continued the work as long as his health permitted.

Thirteen years ago they retired to Torrington where they have since resided.

Survivors include: Widow — sons—Bert, of Ft. Laramie; Clarence, of Torrington; and Allen, of Guernsey, Wisc.; daughters—Mrs. Amos (Pearl) Scott, of Ft. Laramie, and Mrs. R. A. (Leona) White, of Greybull, Wyo.; 18 grandchildren, 36 great-grandchildren; brother—Allen, of Page.

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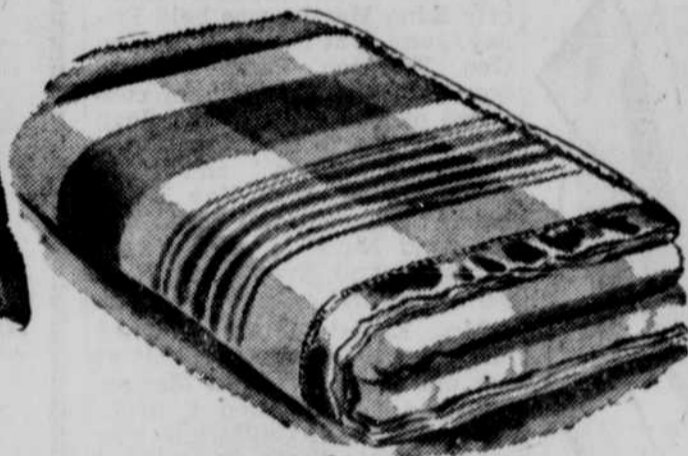

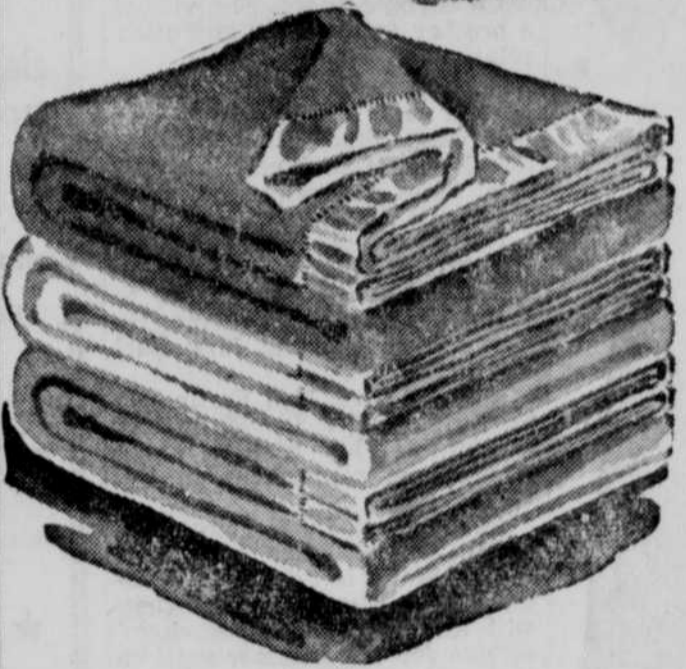

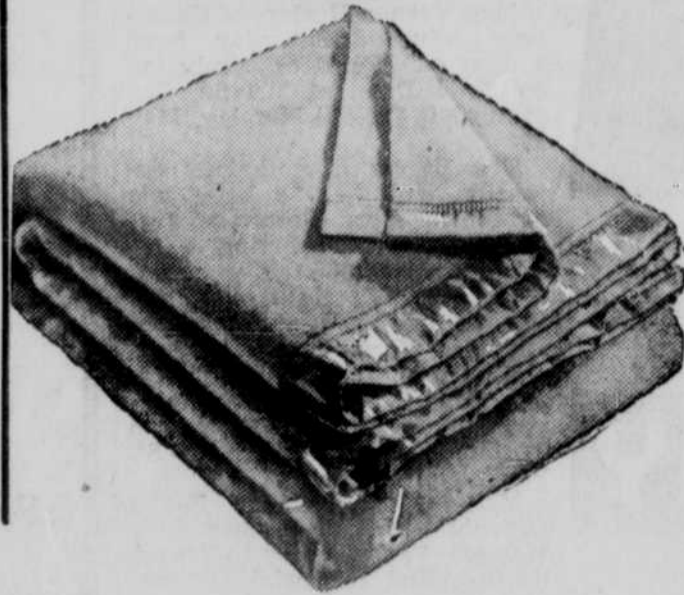
