

## Graves 34 War Dead Decorated at Page

PAGE — Memorial day was observed here by a program at 10:30 a. m. in the school auditorium, directed by the American Legion and auxiliary. The school band provided the music under the direction of Leonard Sawyer.

Rev. George Francis was the speaker. His subject was "What Price Peace?"

Following the program the group reassembled at the cemetery where a wreath was placed on the monument for war dead. The firing squad saluted the dead of all wars, and taps were sounded.

Rev. Francis pronounced the benediction. Thirty-four graves were marked by flags indicating service for their country.

The auxiliary placed poppy wreaths on the graves of the dead of World War II.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Golden, and Miss Kathryn Ann attended the exercises.

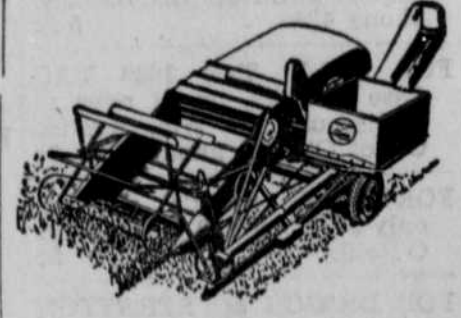

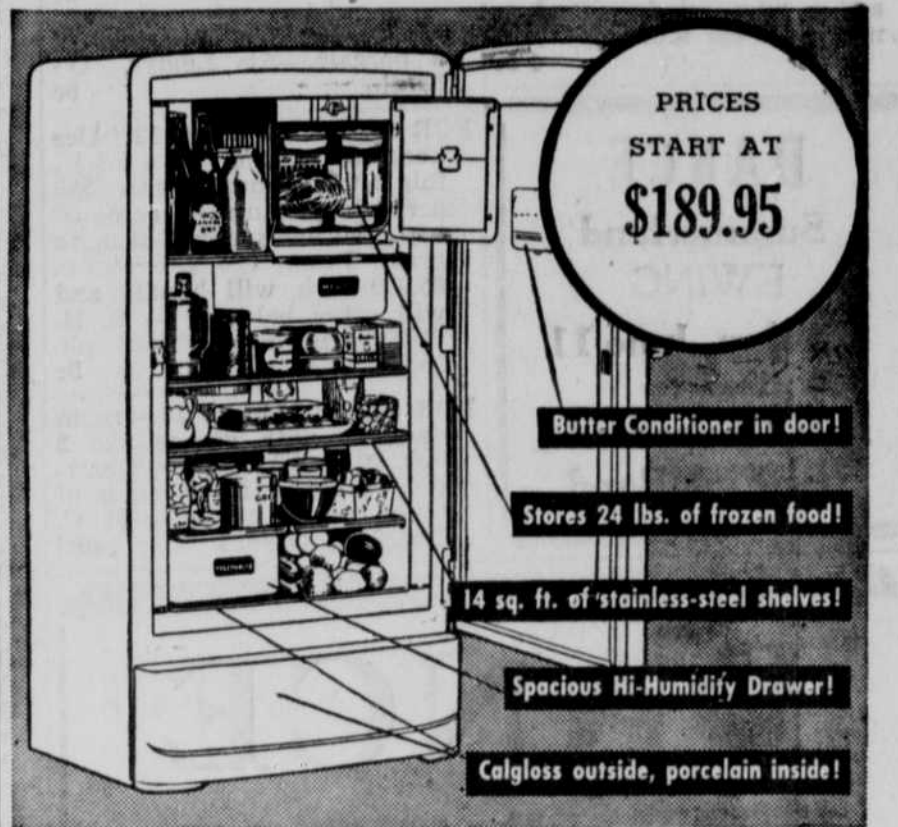
