

Shows—Floods, Tornadoes Cause Greatest Loss



Ploods, tornadoes, storms, fires, and other disasters this year have struck an estimated 40,000 families in 15 of the 16 states comprising the American Red Cross Midwestern Area, shown by the above map. Red Cross officials in charge of aiding disaster victims in the area report a number of disaster operations continuing into the second half of 1950. Largest continuing operations are in the North Dakota-Western Minnesota flood area, where Red Cross has provided continuous assistance since the end of March, with operations complicated by recurring floods and blizzards.
