### SEEK NOMINEES FOR SOIL AWARDS

Again this year the Sioux City Journal-Tribune and the Sioux City Chamber of Commerce are sponsoring a contest for soil conservation achievement in Northeast Nebraska and adjoining northwest Iowa, South Dakota and Minnesota.

The following farmers and ranchers have been nominated for the Holt soil conservation district.

Of those nominated, 3 will be selected by a committee of judges to represent the district in area competition. Judging will be based on (1) completeness of conservation program (40 points); (2) quality of soil conservation work (40 points); these may include seeding, tree planting,

terrace dams, etc., as required and their maintenance; (3) adjustment of livestock program to land use (20 points).

In addition the Journal-Tribune and Sioux City Chamber are sponsoring 2 other contests.

A short course award or an all-expense trip to attend a farm day conservation course given at Ames, Ia., next winter. The individual may be a farmer, rancher, or businessman but will be picked on the basis of his interest in soil conservation and his ability to make use and impart to others his knowledge gained at the short course.

The district will welcome any and all nominations for this award. A lone individual will be selected to represent the district and only one from each state will be awarded the trip. These trips will be paid for by the Mississippi association.

The other award progress. Judging will be based on progress made by the individual in soil conservation work for September 1, 1949, to September 1, 1950. The supervisors are anxious to have nominations for this contest. The district winner will receive a progress certificate. Area winners will receive engraved plaques. All progress winners will be guests of the Sioux City Journal-Tribune and Chamber of Commerce at the November recognition day banquet in Sioux City.

Entries will be appreciated at any time before the judging date of September 15. They may or may not be cooperators of the district.
