

# Osborne & Co. Triumph, 35-0

## O'Neill Outclassed by Visiting Ainsworth Bulldogs

Ken Osborne and Co., sometimes known as Ainsworth high school Bulldogs, rolled through, around and over the O'Neill night, emerging with a handy 35-0 victory in Carney park Friday 6 victory. In fact, O'Neill's crew had difficulty stopping Ainsworth's second team during the latter part of the game.

Osborne is a 170-pound half-back who was explosive from the opening whistle.

But he was capably supported by Quarterback Jim Wheeler, Fullback Jim Zoeller, Halfback Hagerman and a hefty line that outweighed the O'Neill counterparts at least 10 pounds per man.

The Bulldogs handled their assignments well and without any weight advantage their precision and excellent execution of their assignments would have sifted through the Blues, who soon discovered they couldn't do much about the situation.

However, had all the Blues played as well as Tackle Don Klopberg the situation might have been different. Big Don was in on about three-fourths of the O'Neill tackles and played his heart out.

The Blues were in scoring territory on three occasions but muffed them all. On one occasion, Fullback Ed Tomlinson fumbled and Ainsworth recovered; later the Blues lost the ball on downs on the Ainsworth 20, and on another occasion Bill Lyons dropped a pass on the Ainsworth 5 and that scoring threat ended.

The game was less than three minutes old when the visitors had chalked up seven points. O'Neill's Don Calkins in punt formation fumbled on his own 12, Ainsworth recovered, two plays later the oval was across the double-stripe.

Before the quarter ended, Osborne was loosed on a 52-yard gallop to score and End Carl Johnson snaged a pass in the end zone for the extra point, making

the count 14-0.

In the second stanza, Osborne went 25 yards to the midfield stripe. Three plays later he moved the oval from the 25 to the 10, and then powered across for the third counter. For the fourth TD, Johnson gathered up a pass and waltzed 10 yards into the O'Neill endzone.

Osborne racked up the fifth Ainsworth TD by going 35 yards. Last week the Bulldogs were rated number 8 in state class B football circles. Their season's record includes a 6-20 reversal by Alliance, a 31-6 win over Atkinson, a 32-18 triumph from Bassett and a 7-0 victory over Cozad.

O'Neill collected only six first downs in Friday's effort.

Highlights of the game were recorded by the "Voice of The Frontier's" special events unit with George Hammond at the microphone. Excerpts of the recording—22 minutes in length—were rebroadcast Saturday at 9:45 a. m. on the regular "Voice" program. The football portion of the program was sponsored by the Central Finance Corp., Universal Trades School (Omaha) and the Lohaus Motor Co.

Coach Marv Miller's Blues will be gunning for their second win of the season Friday night when they entertain Holy Trinity, of Hartington, in Carney park. Trinity is playing its first year of football.

## Penn State-Husker Game a Sellout

The Nebraska-Penn State football game in Memorial stadium at Lincoln Saturday will be a sell-out. The frontoffice reported Tuesday that all seats are gone except for a few temporary bleacher seats. This means a throng of about 40-thousand will be on hand.

The Huskers are favored to win over the big Penn State team, which boasts less power than a year ago.

Nebraska fizzled last Saturday at Colorado, losing 19-28. It was one of those off days for the Huskers and Colorado was playing bang-up ball.

Nebraska's sophomore sensation, Bobby Reynolds, racked up all three Nebraska touchdowns, maintaining his 2½ TD clip per game.

O'Neill's combined O'Neill high and St. Mary's academy band, under the direction of Ira George, will participate in the band day show during the Penn State game. Sixty Nebraska bands will present a massed performance at intermission.

The O'Neill musicians will leave early Saturday morning by chartered busses, returning late Saturday night. Trip has been underwritten by the Chamber of Commerce. It will be O'Neill's first appearance in the traditional band day activities.

St. Mary's kicked off to North Loup to start the second half and North Loup proceeded to run back the kick. The first try for extra point was missed and the Cards' opponents were given another go.

The count stood 20-13 going into the fourth. The Hilltoppers tied up the game the hard way—grinding the length of the field in short, choppy plunges to make the count 20-19.

Then Carney caught another pass in the endzone to add the tying point. It was a bruising see-saw until the game ended.

A hefty North Loup back named Cvzick (you pronounce it) was a thorn in the side of the Cards all evening.

Krysl's line play was outstanding for Coach Jack Arbuthnot's charges and Back Johnny Joe Uhl played his usual good offensive game. Donohoe's running was also a bright spot for the Cards.
