The sloppy trend in literature of recent years has resulted in fixing the mind of the reading public on a low level. Librarians, educators, authors in a group response to the question emanating from Columbia university as to what they considered the most boring of the classics in literature

listed such works as "Paradise Lost," "Pilgrim's Progress," "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," and even the sublime thoughts of the Old Testament scriptures. The music of words means nothing to the taste fed upon literary husks, the grandeur of the blind poet's description of the celestial, the simple beauty of Bunyan's allegory. Gibbon's matchless style and the moving eloquence of John Clark Ridpath scarcely fit in with modern man's taste for the commonplace.

Swift justice laid a hand on a group of three calling themselves the "hatchet gang" over at Omaha. For robbery and rape three days before they were sentenced to the pen for 25 years. Similar cases in Lincoln have hung in the courts for months.
