

BORER LESS ACTIVE . . . The European corn borer took a smaller bite out of Nebraska's 1950 corn crop than in 1949. University of Nebraska entomologists said this week. There was a loss of over 6-million-dollars this year compared to 11-million-dollars a year ago. The 1950 estimate is based on a state yield of 241-million-bushels with an average loan value of \$1.39 a bushel. Dakota county had the highest count of borers. Other counties where the count was high were Burt, Pierce, Cedar, Dixon, Knox,

Loup, Stanton, Thurston, Washington and Wayne.






