This year, instead of allowing worry to cloud your Christmas spirit, give a little thought in advance to solving this problem. One way to make the holidays merry with little expense is to ask your relatives and neighbors to save for you any toys their older children may have outgrown and discarded.

If you have in your attic or basement playthings that have been tossed aside by big brother or sister, drag those out, too, to see if

they can be fixed up for your younger children. Often minor repairs with a hammer or screw driver will make "broken" toys workable again. And a can of enamel can aid you in not only restoring their new look, but also in glamorizing them beyond their original state. Gay designs, such as those employed by Peter Hunt in his distinctive folk art, are particularly effective. These are easily done by using the basic tear-drop stroke recommended by Hunt.
