They were attended by Miss Dorothy Melcher and Cy Abracht. They are making their home in O'Neill with his parents.

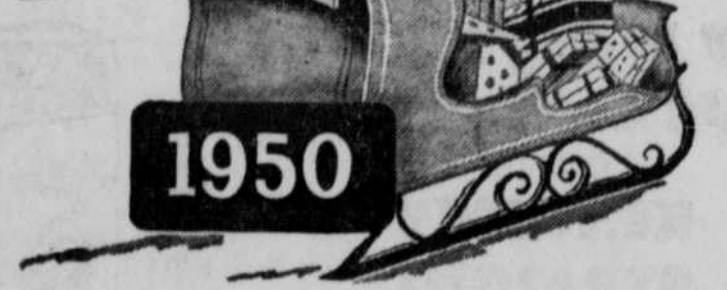
Gets Instruction

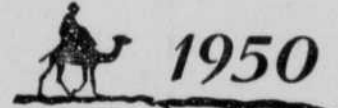

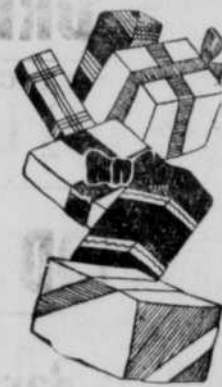
