**'Smuggled' Letter Tells About Reds**

(Continued from page 1.) were herded into bunches like cattle and shot at and beaten. How we lived through it? Well, I am very ill with heart trouble and also need an abdominal operation but there is no money, no medicine.

"I was drafted to teach in junior college in 1946 and have to teach practically day-and-night getting often only two to three hours sleep. Soon I will be unable to carry on and then I will lose one-half of my food rations and as it is it is not enough to live on.

"Today is December 20 and I did not receive my monthly pay. 'The treasury is empty,' they said.

"Our only comfort is the 'Voice of America'—our only contact with the outside world and from it we heard that you still celebrate Christmas in America, which we are not allowed to do here, only at home and in secret. In the churches they must call it the 'Change of Sun Fest.'

"If I could talk to you in person I could tell you many things but I am afraid to write more.

"We are very concerned over the U. S. boys in Korea and hope to be liberated here some day.
