WEEKLY CROSSWORD PUZZLE

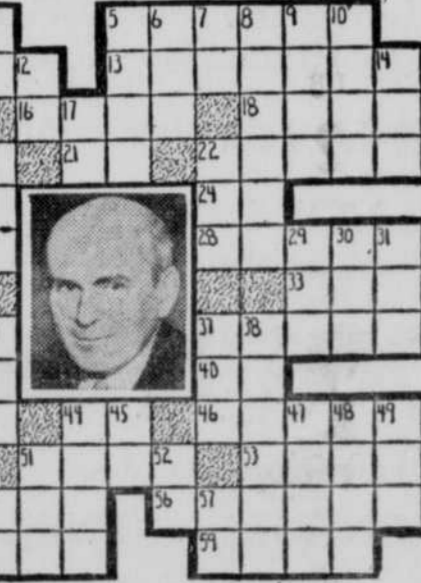
