Governor's Budget Talk 'Well-Received'

Gov. Val Peterson's budget message, calling for the biggest budget in Nebraska history, was received favorably Monday by the state legislature.

"Conservative," "timely," and "sound" were some of the comments as the senators discussed the message afterward.

Chairman Arthur Carmody said his budget committee had not checked the requests of the various agencies. But he predicted the board of control budget might have to be increased somewhat with the governor's recommendations because of rapidly rising costs. The board made up its request some time ago.

Pay raises are indicated for state employees "if we are to keep the same level of service," Carmody continued.

"And if the people want more and better roads, we must expect to pay more for them," Carmody added.

The budget chairman said he approved the suggestion to give the university regents, the normal board and the board of control discretion as to how their respective appropriations should be divided.

"If you begin breaking down the university's appropriation, for example, you inject the school of medicine directly into politics," Carmody explained.

Chairman Tvrdek, of the revenue committee, termed the governor's message "very good — very sound, thoughtful."

Senator Burney, vice-chairman of the budget committee and a strong advocate of a state sales tax, predicted the governor "might not be averse if one were passed."

Burney said a sales tax would take the state out of the property tax field, and furnish revenue, besides, for aid to schools or counties.

Chairman Cramer of the education committee, called the governor's budget "pretty realistic."
