ELECTIONS BEGIN IN HOLT SCHOOLS

Student Government Work Is Now Underway; Program Told

"Campaigning" is underway among junior class members in Holt county's high schools as the date nears for the annual Cornhusker county government program.

The affair will be held in O'Neill on Monday, February 19. Commonly seen are corridor and playground "electioneering" conferences as juniors seek to become county "officers" for a day.

The youths, after being duly "elected" at polls in each school, will move in at the various courthouse offices and work alongside the regularly constituted officers for a day of practical civics.

District Judge D. R. Mounts, of O'Neill, who will help guide the students, Tuesday announced the program:

9:30 a. m.—Students report to respective county offices to meet regular county officers and become acquainted with location of office.

9:50 a. m.—General assembly in district court room. Lawrence Hamik, county chairman, presiding.

10:00 a. m.—Brief statement of purpose by Charles E. Chace, commander American Legion, Atkinson. Frank Cronk, chairman Holt county board of supervisors, will introduce each regular county official (elective and appointive), who will in turn introduce boys and girls representing each office.

10:20 a. m.—Address: "Aims, Purposes and Operation of County Government," by Judge Mounts.

10:50 a. m.—Oath of office administered by County Judge L. W. Reimer.

10:55 a. m.—Invitation to lunch by Mrs. Don Enright, president American Legion auxiliary, O'Neill. Announcements.

11:00 a. m.—Adjourn to respective offices to begin work.

11:45 a. m.—Leave for luncheon.

12:00 to 1:15 p. m.—Luncheon at American Legion hall, J. D. Cronin, toastmaster. Address: District Judge Lyle E. Jackson, Neligh.

1:30 p. m.—Report for work in respective county offices.

(1) One boy or girl from each county office will summarize information and activity. (2) County officials will correct any misinformation. (3) Students will be admonished to write report at once, so complete information may be given to school body at general assembly and for use when making reports to other organizations. (4) Simonson post 93 will award a prize for the best report. Cornhusker boys' and girls' county government contestants must mail their reports to American Legion, O'Neill, so they will be received by March 1. (5) Appreciation of participation by Virgil L. Laursen, commander, American Legion, O'Neill.
