REDDIRD— Frank H. Osborn, 87, an old settler of northeast Holt county, died at his home in Norfolk on Saturday, March 24.

He came to the Redbird community with his parents at the age of 17 years. He grew to manhood there and on December 31, 1884, he married Carrie Ward Willis. They located on a farm in Holt county, later moving to a farm in Knox county near the little town of Knoxville.

He and his wife resided there continuously, with the exception of 8 months spent in Canada, until they moved to Norfolk in 1920.

His wife, Carrie, passed away in 1936.

In 1942 he married Lucile Worf, of O'Neill.

Survivors include: Widow—Lucile; nephew—William Willis; and a half-brother, who resides in Maryland.

The Osborns raised the nephew, William Willis, taking him into their home when he was 8-years-old.

Among those attending the funeral were William Willis and wife of Nemo, S. D., and Mrs. Frank Hunter, of Redbird.

Funeral services for the late Mr. Osborn were held Tuesday in a Norfolk funeral home.

Rev. E. G. Brinkmeyer, of First Congregational church, officiated. Mr. Osborn was custodian of this church for over 30 years.

Lynch, medical, "doing well," and other ideas.

The idea has also spread to other states.

Over 275 newsmen and their wives attending the annual NPA banquet heard Dr. Alfred Haake, of the General Motors corporation, discuss, "We Can Still Save America."

Doctor Haake, an industrial authority, economist, lecturer and General Motors consultant, listed three dangers for the U. S.

1. Russia.
2. Infiltration of collectivist-minded people into our government.

3. The danger that we may voluntarily relinquish what we are not fighting to preserve.

He warned against the growing authority of the executive branch of government over the national economy. "President Truman is carrying on a fight for freedom aboard," said Doctor Haake, "but at home he is supporting the Spence bill which would give the executive absolute control of our economy."

Doctor Haake said inflation must be controlled by curtailing spending and increasing production. He said present anti-inflation measures are wrong, offering the comparison of "trying to hold the lid of a tea kettle down while increasing the heat under it at the same time."

Mrs. Blanche Pease, editor of The Frontier Woman, won a prize for best weekly department in the women's division. She also edits the Kitchen Corner in the Atkinson Graphic and entered both departments together.
