**State Capitol News—**

**Peterson vs. Butler in GOP Primary?**

LINCOLN — High cost of politics may well determine the winner in the chase for the republican nomination for U.S. senator.

It's generally conceded here that Gov. Val Peterson will buck heads with his old friend, Sen. Hugh Butler, for the nomination. As this was written, Peterson had not formally announced his intention to run but he had said he would not seek a fourth term as governor nor would he run for the house of representatives.

The governor's supporters are frankly worried about the financial angle of a campaign against Butler.

The white-haired Omahan is reputed to be a millionaire and wouldn't mind shelling out liberally in his effort to keep the title of senator, which he enjoys immensely.

To beat him, Peterson will have to find several "angels" willing to lay the dough on the line. One factor that makes this difficult is that Butler hasn't made a lot of enemies during his two terms. Had he trod on some well-shined toes, the governor probably would have a better chance of rounding up the contributions.

In his hard-fought battle against former Gov. Dwight Griswold, Butler spent about \$50,000, records in the office of the secretary of state show. People who know about such things insist that actually twice that amount was spent in his behalf. So money is no object in Butler's planning.

**The Strategy—**

To offset the financial disadvantage at which he's likely to

find himself the governor, according to his friends, will have to hammer away at Butler's age. Right now the Omaha senator is 73, one of the oldest men in the senate. He'll be 80 before he completes a third term.

Of course, Peterson won't be able to allude directly to his opponent's advanced years, but he'll harp on the theme that these perilous times require a physically strong man on the job.

The governor's political advisors have sized up the statewide situation and they're not discouraged.

**A Machine? —**

One of the unanswered questions in Nebraska politics for a long time has been whether there is such a thing as the "Butler machine."

There's no question the senator has built up a kind of organization in which men like Paul Kruger, of Ft. Calhoun, and Chris Abbott, of Hyannis, are leaders. But whether they are able to deliver an election is pretty dubious.

This organization supported Senator Taft in the famous all star primary of 1948. You remember what happened. Taft ran a bad third behind Harold Stassen and Thomas E. Dewey. The New York governor got over three times as many votes as Taft and Stassen had nearly four times as many.

**Ding-Dong—**

Griswold was defeated by Butler in the 1946 GOP primary, 87,589 to 48,208. The former governor carried only 2 counties.

Nobody knows this better than Val Peterson. As a former secretary to Dwight Griswold, he knew him intimately. As a campaign manager for Hugh Butler, he was equally familiar with his political thinking.

Those facts must be counted

as assets to Peterson. He is determined to avoid the mistakes Griswold made. (Example: Peterson has traveled the state almost constantly since his election. No town is so small for him; he has made dozens of high school commencement speeches.)

And, of course, he is aware of Butler's weaknesses and will work hard to capitalize on them. Just about anyway you look at it, Nebraska is going to have a ding-dong political punching-match before next April 1.
