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Some Classes Higher in July 5 Sale

There were 800 hogs and 125 cattle on the Thursday, July 5, sale at the O'Neill Livestock Market. Receipts were expected to be down for the day - after - the Fourth, but the market was good and some classes went higher than the week before.

A few small packages of steers, weighing 500 to 600 pounds, were quoted from \$35.00 to \$36.50; heifers, in the 500 to 600 pound class, sold from \$33.00 to \$35.00; some shelly canner cows ranged from \$17.00 to \$19.00, while medium cows, in very light supply, were moving from \$21.00 to \$23.00. Good fat cows, of which there were a few on the market, ranged from 24c to 26 1/2c, and bulls, 27c to 29c.

Hog receipts were good for this season of the year. The 190- to 240- pound butchers sold from \$22.00 to \$22.25; 240- to 270- pounders, \$21.50 to \$22.00; 270- to 300 pounders, \$21.00 to \$21.50. Some feeding sows, lightweight and vaccinated, brought from \$21.25 down to \$20.00; heavier sows, 300- to 350 pounds, \$19.00 to \$19.25.

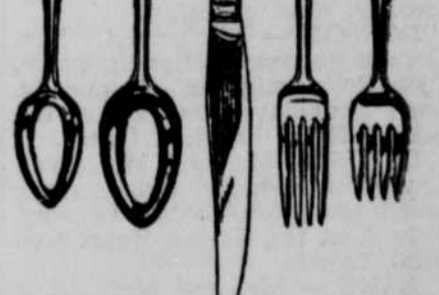
