That's Blanche Pease puffing her way to the typewriter to turn out a department for you. Am I ever busy these days? We are building a new home and I always thought I was busy before, but now I'm frantic! Grin.
Anyway, there isn't any time to be bored around our house or to think up something to fill the time. I whipped up a cake yesterday after dinner, then washed up the dishes and it was late before I got to the typewriter. Today, after lunch, the cake has practically disappeared, so I took time to mix up a large batch of butterscotch ice box cookies. I'll bake them in the morning while I do my kitchen work.

I have been fixing various types of desserts, but it's a funny thing, the dessert the men seem to like as well as any is just plain old fashioned rice with milk and sugar. They eat more of it than of pies, fancy desserts, puddings and so on. I cook a double batch of it in the pressure cooker in record time.

When it comes to salads, I try to select the kind that can be served for more than a single meal, and I make a double batch of it, so that I don't have to fix 2 salads a day.

Here's one I plan to fix for tomorrow. It calls for 1 can of red kidney beans, well drained, 3 hard boiled eggs, 3 or 4 sweet pickles, diced, 1 onion, diced. If you wish, add some diced celery. Salt well and mix with salad dressing. This is better if made up a couple of hours before meal time.

Here's a different variety of potato salad than most of us usually serve.

You can combine 3 cups cooked diced potatoes, 3 tablespoons of chopped onions, and 3/4 cup cooked green peas. Marinate in 1/4 cup French dressing. Just before serving add: 1/2 cup diced cucumbers, 1/2 cup carrot slices (which have been crisped in the refrigerator). Mix in 1/2 cup cooked salad dressing. Serve in lettuce cups.

Here is a new kind of a pudding:

BAKED CHOCOLATE PUDDING

One cup sifted cake flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 1/2 tablespoons cocoa. Sift dry ingredients into mixing bowl and add 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix and pour into an 8x8-inch cake pan. Over this sprinkle 1 cup sugar mixed with 5 tablespoons cocoa, and then pour over all this 1 cup of hot water. Bake 40 minutes in moderate oven.

There will be a chocolate sauce in the bottom when cool. Serve with whipped cream. Men love this dessert.

Save Time By . . .

Using waxed paper to fit the cookie sheet. When the cookies are baked, slip off the paper and put fresh sheet on for the next batch. Saves oiling the cookie sheet each time and dish washing, too.

Use waxed paper to line the cake pans. Grease the cake pan, then fit in waxed paper cut to fit, and grease the waxed paper. It can simply be peeled from the cake when it is baked, and the cake pans can be put away.

Sift flour on sheets of waxed paper instead of in bowls. Lots

less dish washing that way, you know.
Crushing the lumps in the brown sugar with a rolling pin, before creaming with shortening. Saves time.

Use the waxed paper carton you buy milk in to pack ice box cookie dough. Just cut off the top with the scissors, rinse clean with cold water and pack the ice box dough in. Bottom can be removed after dough is chilled and the dough pushed out and sliced evenly. All cookies will be same shape.

PAGE—Allen Haynes received word Thursday of the death of his nephew, Marvin Haynes, of Guernsey, Wyo., whose death occurred July 4.

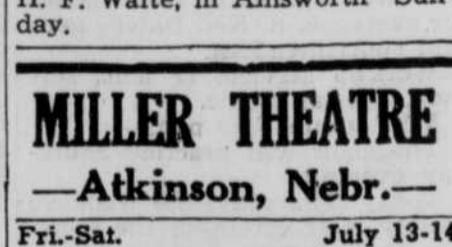

He is survived by his wife, Zella; 3 sons and a step-son; father, 2 brothers, 4 sisters and 3 half-sisters.

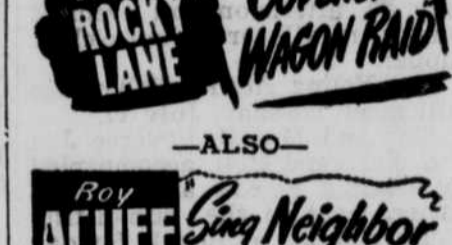

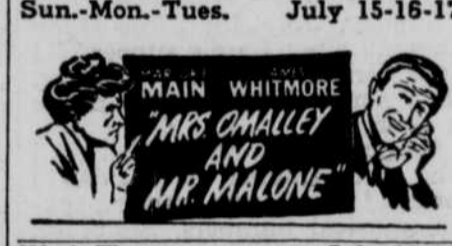
