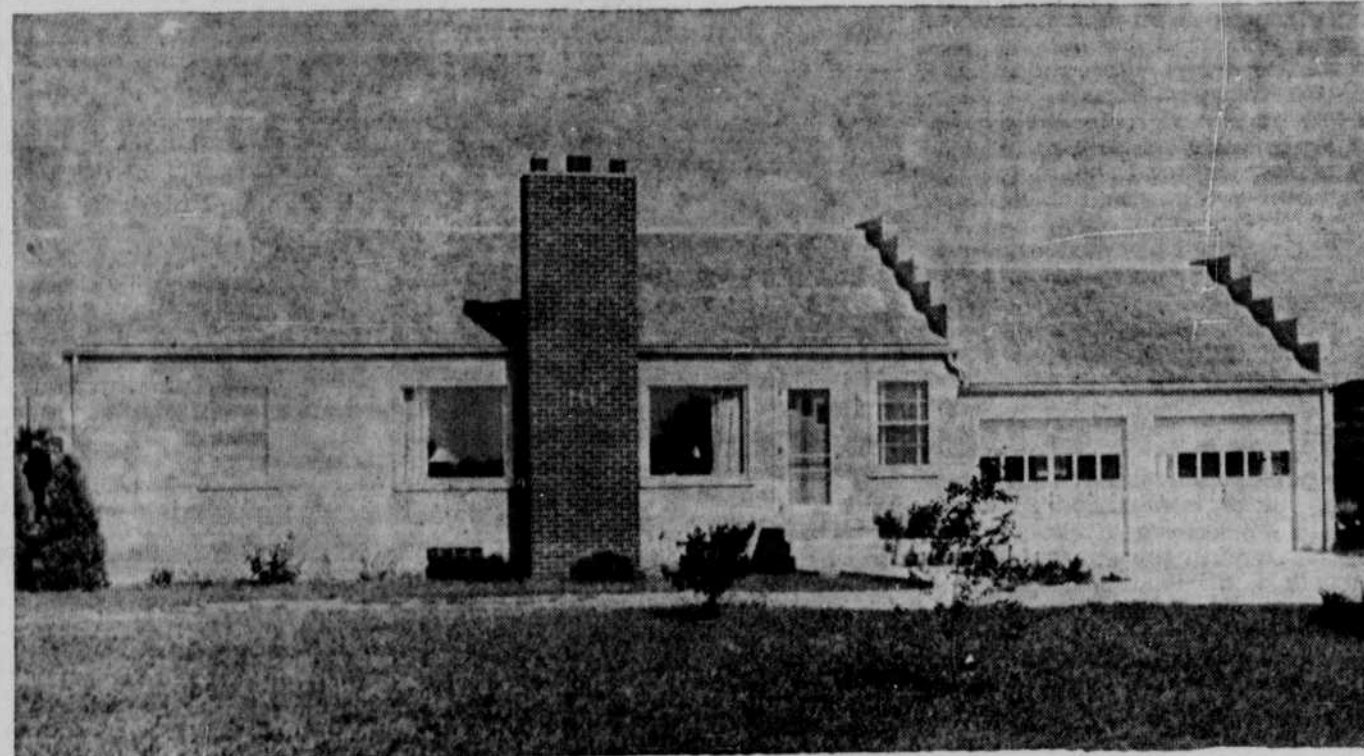
Celebrate 25th Wedding Anniversary

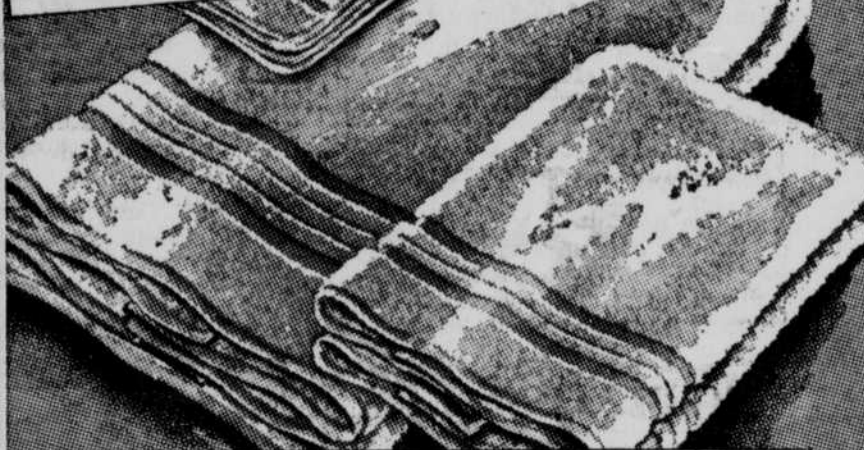

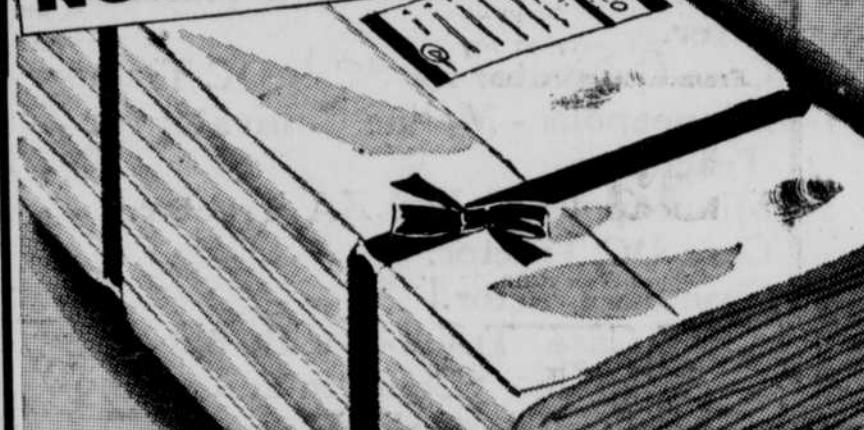
