CPPD Line Upped to 115,000-Volts

The high tension power line between O'Neill and Norfolk, constructed a year ago and operating during that interval at 33,000-volt capacity on Wednesday, August 1, was increased to its rated 115,000-volt capacity.

The line is owned by Consumers Public Power district. L. C. Walling, O'Neill district manager, stated that the O'Neill-Twin Church (near Dakota City) at the same time was increased from 33,000-volts to 69,000.

Walling declared that "in a very short time we will be feeding current from the O'Neill power center to Ft. Randall on a new line now being completed."

Until now Randall has been served by small diesel plants that have been accommodating the dam site with energy during the construction stages.

When the dam is completed several years from now, the Randall-O'Neill line will carry power in the opposite direction. O'Neill is one of the key power centers in Nebraska by virtue of its strategic location.

Why did Lee raise a rebellious hand against the federal government? The Southern mind reasoned they had the same right to secede from the Union that the colonists had to set up a government in defiance of the British crown. The colonists withdrew from something they were not attached to by representatives. "Taxation without representation." Southern states rebelled after accepting the federal constitution and had their representatives in congress. Any difference?

Industrial centers are easily reached by those making their homes in pleasant villages nearby. It was in a charming community known as New Lebanon, near Dayton, O., I found my son, Glenn, and family making their home in a setting of green on a quiet street. Glenn is occupied with printing in the city and oil interests in Texas. My youngest son and his capable wife have a delightful home on an uncrowded street in the village of Mt. Joy, Penn., a few minutes drive from Lancaster, where he is a designing engineer for the RCA and his wife is the "county mother" to under-privileged children.

Pennsylvania has come the nearest to solving the highway problems of any of the states. The Pennsylvania turnpike extends from Philadelphia to Pittsburgh and is maintained by a toll system which eventually will pay the cost of building. Two lanes carry west bound traffic and 2 lanes east bound traffic. The turnpike goes through no towns the length of the state but points of entry and departure are provided. Travelers pay the toll when they leave the turnpike, this based on the mileage traveled.
