School Lunch Sandwiches—

Make a smooth paste of 2 tablespoons butter and 3 tablespoons peanut butter, spread 12 slices of bread generously. Sprinkle ½ cup chopped celery over peanut butter mixture. Set flakes of salmon on 6 of the slices (1 cup of salmon is needed). Sprinkle with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Cover with remaining slices of bread. Makes 6 big sandwiches.

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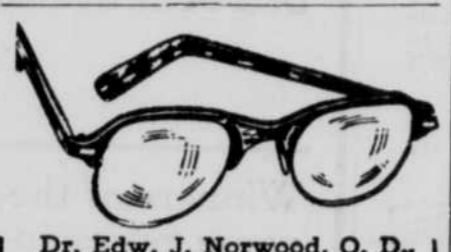
