M. and at that time publicly opened and read for SAND GRAVEL FOR SURFACING and incidental work on the ATKINSON - BURWELL and AMELIA WEST Patrols Nos. 81014 and 81015 State Roads.

Choosing a Baby Sitter Is an Important Decision

MODERN mothers often feel they are called upon to make an unfair choice. Since today's young families often live far away from older-generation relatives and home-town friends, wives either have to stick at home with no evenings out, or else they have to call in outsiders whenever they decide to arrange a break in routine. When it's the latter, it's sometimes with fear that they turn over their offspring to a sitter.

This apprehension on the part of parents can be lessened if they will observe a few precautions.

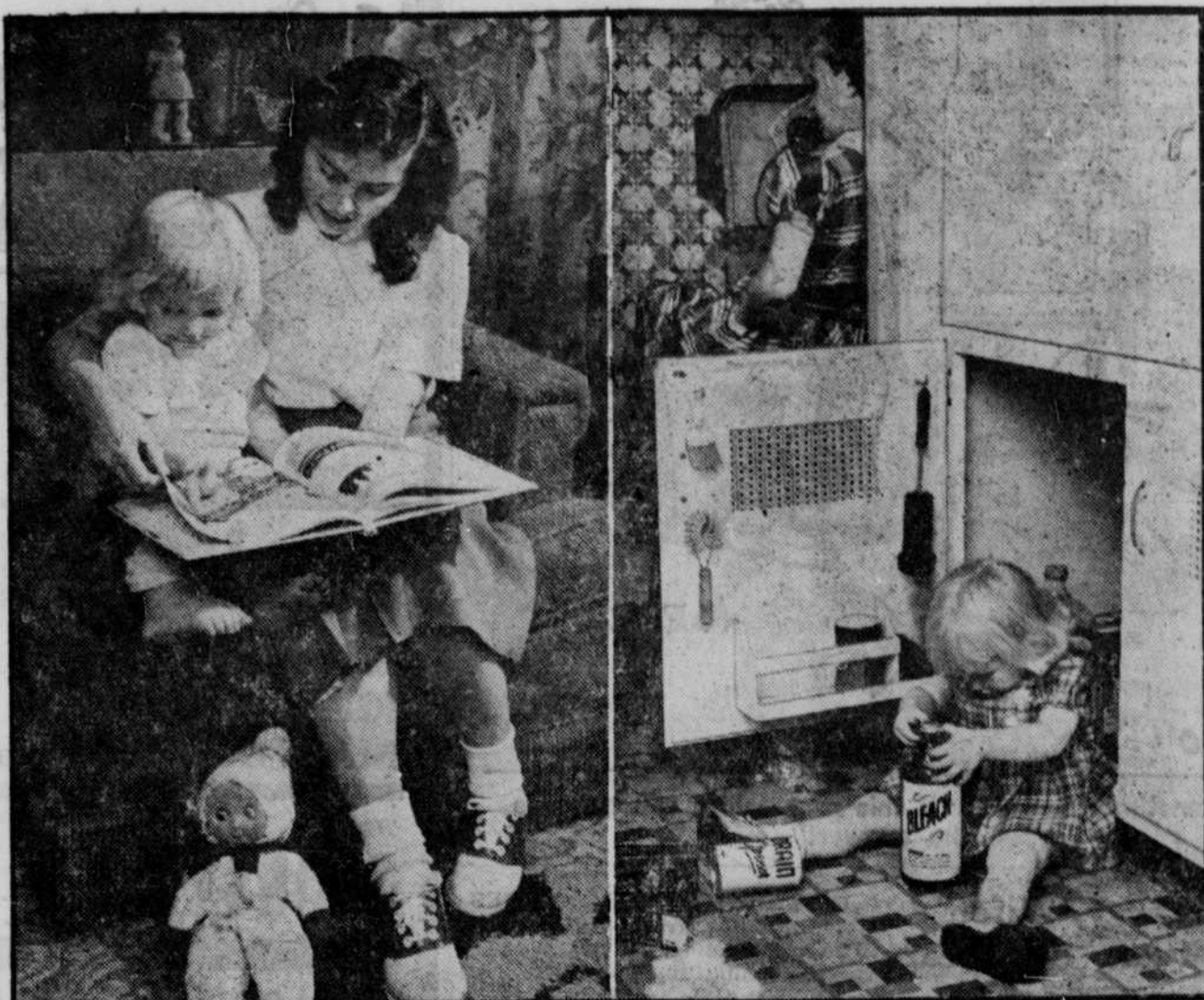
Avoid spur-of-the-moment calls for sitters. It's best to investigate carefully and leisurely the person with whom you're considering leaving your baby.

As a general rule, the too elderly and the too immature are to be avoided.

Such practices as entertaining friends or making lengthy phone calls are taboo, and should be pointed out as such.

Mothers should leave definite instructions concerning the child's routine. And put out, within convenient reach, any special toys that will help keep the child happy and entertained.

And last of all, prepare for emergencies. Leave with the sitter the telephone number and address of another responsible adult (in case you can't be reached), your doctor, and the fire and police departments.

To Dedicate New Parochial School

ATKINSON—Sunday, September 9, will be a red-letter day in the history of St. Joseph's parish. The new grade school will be dedicated. This modernistic and well equipped school is built of cement brick with brick veneer finishing. Each of the 4 large classrooms comprises a space of 28 by 32 feet. A hall 8 feet wide leads from the main entrance to the office room. The walls of both the main and the side halls are finished with a 4-foot ivory tiling. Asphalt tiling is used as floor covering throughout the entire building. Unilateral lighting, fluorescent lights, green chalk boards and spacious tack boards figure prominently in the new building. The latest style of hot air furnace will heat the school. Arthur Humpal was the contractor.

The dedicatory program will begin at 4:30 p.m., Sunday, September 9. The main speaker for the occasion will be Rev. Nightingale, of St. Joseph's parish, Omaha. Reverend Nightingale is the first alumnus of St. Joseph's school to be ordained to the priesthood. Rev. Richard Parr is pastor. The school is taught by the Benedictine Sisters, of Mt. St. Scholastica, Atchison, Kans.

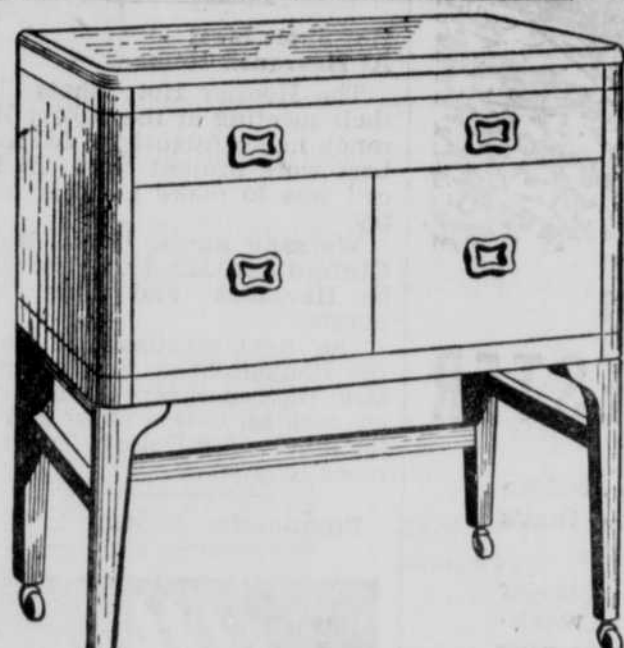
