PAGE — Mr. and Mrs. Allen Haynes received a letter from their grandson, Pvt. Elwin Haynes, telling of his trip to Japan. He landed at Yokohama, Japan, September 7 after sailing for 11½ days. His ship was 525 feet long and 72 feet wide and carried 3,000 soldiers.

Although it was a long, weary voyage the boys also found several things to help pass the time. There were church services each day, a movie every night on the top of the ship when weather permitted, and a library. He also wrote of getting "very sea sick" the first day but the rest of the time he felt fine.

A letter was received several days later stating he was in Korea.
