## Busy Summer for 'Mrs. Farmer'—New Pump, Yard Fills, New Yard and Flowers

Buy some of those little miniature candy bars, the very tiny wrapped ones and now and then, send them for a treat in the children's school lunch boxes.

There are regular uses for regular sized milk chocolate bars, by the way. Soften the chocolate in the double boiler, for example, and use to coat or dip nuts, candied fruits, dates or marshmallows.

Soften and use for cake filling, adding no other ingredients at all.

Soften and use to ice small cakes.

Soften, add a tablespoon or 2 of hot water or boiling water and use for sauces on puddings and ice creams.

For a change, your children will probably like cocoa doughnuts. All children like something different and that goes for the grown ups, too.

**COCOA DOUGHNUTS**  
These are a nice idea for Halloween refreshments, also. Three cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 3 tablespoons cocoa, 1 whole egg, 1 egg yolk, 1/2 cupful sugar, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 1/2 cupful hot mashed potatoes, sour milk. Sift the flour, baking powder, cocoa and soda together. Beat the eggs light and add the sugar and butter melted, also the mashed potatoes. Mix the ingredients together and add just enough sour milk to make a dough that can be handled easily. Roll lightly and cut into very tiny doughnuts. Fry in hot fat, cool and dredge with powdered sugar.
