52 Herefords Gross \$26,995

A large crowd attended the fall sale of the Holt County Hereford Breeders association held in O'Neill Saturday, October 13. Fifty-two head of cattle sold for \$26,995, an average of \$518. Thirty-five bulls sold for \$20,290, an average of \$579, and 17 females sold for \$6,665, an average of \$392.

Benton Marshall, well known Hereford breeder of Crawford, chose lot 34, VH Adv. Silver 43rd, as the grand champion bull. The bull of Silver Knight breeding sold to Morton Bros., of Bassett, for \$1,000.

The reserve champion bull, Beau Paladin, of Paladin and Anxiety breeding, was shown by Francis Anderl, of Inman. Donald Kinzer, of Colome, S.D., purchased the bull for \$1,000.

The top selling bull, HW North Star 43rd, of WHR and Baron Blanchard breeding, was bought by Frank Dobrichovsky, of Verdel, for \$1010. D. E. Bowen and Son, of Page, sold Proud Mixer 11th to H. B. Stoltenberg and Son, of Burton, for \$1,000. The bull was of WHR and Militant Domino breeding.
