WASHINGTON, D. C.

On the floors of the two houses, the Congress has not been very active this week. The death of Senator Willis of Ohio slowed down the Senate. The death of Representative Gallivan of Massachusetts likewise stopped House action in pending bills. The House passed a number of minor bills and rejected the proposal of the rubber interests that the anti-trust laws be amended to permit them to form a buying pool to purchase rubber.

But while these things have been going on, the machinery of the two houses is working-committees are

considering legislation and everyone is busy.

Last week, I discussed the flood control bill that passed the Senate. It has hit hard going in the House. The Senate said that it will cost \$325,000,000. Estimates before the House bodies indicate that the cost will possibly exceed \$1,000,000,000,000. Several of its proposals are being very vigorously contested. The President is reported to be very much opposed to the present plan. The indications now are that flood control will be postponed temporarily while the House takes up the farm legislation that has been reported by the Committee on Agriculture. It is probable that before this is printed in Nebraska, the House will be considering that measure-if it has not passed it.

Congressman Haugen claims that the bill has been so modified now that it proposes "two distinct and entirely separable remedies for the farm situation, meeting largely the President's objections." The bill proposes loans to cooperative associations at a low rate of interest and if that fails to accomplish the desired end, then it authorizes the making of marketing agreements providing that costs and losses would be paid by the commodity whose producers receive the direct benefit.

The Senate is debating farm relief. Senator McNary has attempted to secure an agreement fixing a time to vote but so far has been unable to get some of the southern senators to agree. He expressed the hope to me this morning that the Senate would act soon on the measure in that body.
